WHAT CAN CANADA DO.

Dealing with the above question in the spirit of empire some months ago Dr. Andrew McPhail a gifted son of this Province contributed an article to the University Magazine. It is one that thoughtful men would do well to read if they are interested in the relation of Canada to Britain for it is comprehensive and puts the matter fairly and squarely before readers, and there will be found many to agree with his final summ'ng up.

We Canadians, he says, who are not writers and talkers did not think that we were doing anything unusual these two centuries past, making a living as best we might, defending our little clearings against wild beasts, our homes against savages, and our little towns against marauders from the United States. Our forefathers did as much against Spaniard, French, or Dane; indeed, against English, Scotch, or Irish. We did all that lay at our hands in the most innocent way in the world. We dug harbours, built lighthouses, laid down railways, excavated canals. We have policed our waters and prevented strangers from stealing our fish. We have kept good order over a territory as large as the half of Europe and made life and property fourteen hundred miles from Edmonton as safe as it is in Trafalgar Square, and much safer than in Whitechapel Road.

"What perplexes us most is the saying in everybody's mouth, that, unless we do something—give a battleship or a preference, or send Sir Wilfrid Laurier to a conference in London—the Empire will go to pieces. The Empire has always been going to pieces, even from a time which is far beyond the memory of any man now living. The Venetian ambassador in 1557 heard the same complaint in London, at a time when, as he notes, hammers were beating in one place, tubs hooping in another, and pots clinking in a third; when the artisans were so rich that they made good cheer in a tavern oftener than every day with rabbits, hares, and all sorts of viands."

"I think now that I have made it clear that we do not cost England anything at the present moment. If England 'cut the painter,' as the saying is, she would not save a penny. She would require the same number of battleships to defend her shores and convoy her food. Otherwise she would starve in six weeks. We are not insensible to the sacrifices which England has made in the past on our behalf; but those were inseparable from her career of greatness, and we are making sacrifices too.

"Our loyalty is to the King who

holds headship over our race, and to its ancient tradition of 'truth, pity, freedom, and hardness.' The genius of England in political affairs has been little more than the capacity to exercise patience. The time has come for us all—in England, South Africa, Australia, and Canada—to learn the lesson and be patient, to become vitally interested in one another, to abstain from giving offence, to speak the truth in love. So, in time, we shall develop a mutual trust and affection, which must precede any final constructive policy, either economic or constitutional.

BOVINE TUBERCULOSIS.

Bovine Tuberculosis is a matter that is of great interest to dairy farmers and the method of applying the tuberculin test and destroying infected cows has always been a topic that has aroused many protests. The farmers in some cases have had to suffer the whole loss and this has been hard to bear. In the state of New York the state Dept. of Agriculture has given a good deal of attention to the eradication of tuberculosis in cows. This year according to an exchange, the department asked for \$120,000 appropriation for stamping out tuberculosis in cows. The sum was cut to \$70,000, the department protesting that if could not carry on the work for that sum. While this agitation was going forward, the head of the department was charged. R. A. Pearson was made commissioner. His first act was to declare against the tuberculin test and slaughter of cows. In do-

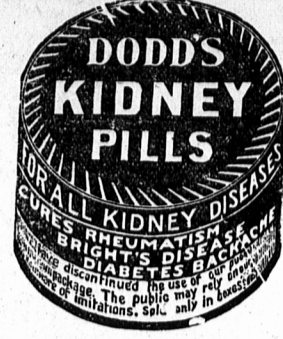
ing this he took position in the tanks of the more advanced. It was revolution so far as this state was concerned. It was an advocacy of the Bang or Danish plan of dealing with bovine tuberculosis. The new commissioner advocated the plan of the fullest physical examination, the isolation of infected cows, the sequestration of the calves, the Pasteurization of the milk of the infected animals, and the use of such Pasteurized milk for the making of cheese and the feeding of calves. In this advocacy he was supported by the example of Massachusetts, which state had abandoned the tuberculin test and had adopted the Bang plan.

The state has taken up the matter. Already the Assembly has passed the bill drawn by Commissioner Pearson, which bill appropriates \$200,000 for the purpose of inspection and sequestration. The bill has yet to pass the Senate. It is probable, as an operation of the law, if it becomes such, that hereafter there will be a more rigid inspection of animals imported into the state, at the two points where the importations are made—New York and Buffalo.

HORSE NOTES.

Admiral Dewey, who died at the farm of his owner, Dr. J. C. McCoy, Kirkwood, Del., last Thursday night of heart failure, was bred by the late J. Malcolm Forbes, and was foaled in 1898. He was the second foal of Nancy Hanks, and it was but natural that when he showed wonderful speed from the first time that he was asked to step, there should be a whole lot of interest in his career. He was taken to the Readville track the summer that he was 2 years old, and had every one crazy by the pace he could show. It is doubtful if any trotter that has ever been foaled had more

natural speed. He had better than a two-minute brush as a 2-year-old, and the next season as a 3-year-old he had the speed of a free-for-all pacer. He was started in two races, both at Readville. He won them both taking a record of 2:14 in a 2000 event for 3-year-olds during the grand circuit meeting in August. The second race a \$5000 event for 3-year-olds he also won. He was a speed marvel from the time that he first saw a track. In 1905 Dr. McCoy gave the stallion a careful preparation and succeeded in giving him a record of 2:04 1/2 in a trial against time. Dr. McCoy recently refused an offer of \$35,000 for Admiral Dewey to go to Russia.
