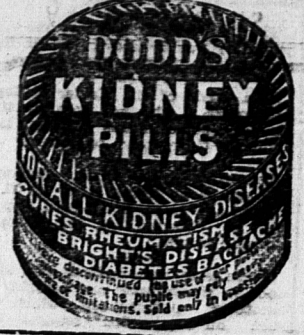
Alex McDonald, Souris, is recovering from his recent illness.
