Meet Oliver and Jemmett

A continuation of W. J. Foley's "Who's Who" on "Big Six" hockey-ists, has the following Abbie players listed:

Tommy Oliver comes from Upper Canada. He first attracted attention when playing in Sussex in the old New Brunswick League. He was considered a fair player until he teamed up last season with Harold Gross on the Abegweit defence. Then he suddenly became good. Not only player, Oliver is a consistent performer and should have another good season. He is 34 years old, weighs 169 pounds and is married.

Chuck Jemmett was considered a top-up centre player before he joined the Truro Bearcats at the start of the 1931-32 season. That season he led the Eastern League in scoring and won the trophy for the most valuable player. Jemmett is flashy at times, has always been noted for

his deadly work around an opposing cage and is a play-maker. With the new rules in force, Jemmett should have a good season. Already this season Jemmett is showing fine form in workouts and was a stand-out in the recent Charlottetown-Ottawa match. Chuck is 28 years old, weighs 150 pounds and also is married. Maybe that's the reason he has so much to say while on the ice, sometimes. Being a married man he probably gets few chances to talk at home.

O'Connor May Lead Saint John

If the Ottawa Citizen knows anything about it or has been able to find out anything about it, then Chuck O'Connor, the coach who led the Dalhousie rangers to a Maritime championship last winter, will be the man in charge of the embryonic Saint John hockey team this winter. The Citizen says O'Connor expects to leave the Dominion Capital shortly for Saint John and believes he will have such players as Kick McCann, Bill Walker, Frankie Graham, Bill Miller, Sharpe of Campbellton, Red Cook, Frank LeBlanc, Bill Gulliver, Duke Taylor and Clint Gammon. The fans are anxiously awaiting some sort of a definite announcement.

## Big Three Loop Opens Tonight On Local Forum Ice

Abbies And Moncton Hawks Ready And Waiting For The Whistle—Large Crowd Expected To Witness Inaugural Tilt.

This evening the Maritime Hockey League will be officially opened with the Abbies hosts of the Moncton Hawks in the first loop contest, which is being played two days prior to the opening of the season last year, as the "Big Six" pre-season did not get under way until Nov. 23.

The all-Maritime cycle this year, including the Abbies, Hawks and Halifax Wolverines, is considered the class of these seaward provinces, and already loop entrants have served notice to other sections of their strength. Moncton Hawks defeated the Montreal Royals by a 2-1 count, while the Ottawa Rideaus in a tour of the circuit were handed three trimmings and managed to barely eke out a draw in their first start with the Wolverines.

In the second contest, however, the Vair pack handed the Ottawa club a 6-to-1 lacing while the Abbies also nosed them out, 2-to-1 and Thursday night last Perc Nicklin's Hawks polished off the tour with a neat coat of whitewash to cap the contest 4-to-0.

Each of the three teams this year has added considerable strength to their squad of last winter and, although they have been on the ice for shortly over a week only, each shows improvement and added punch. Nicklin, with a collection of 14 players, has already rounded out another hard-checking, fast-skating aggregation.

The three clubs have imported coaches, the Abbies having Jimmy Gardner, former N. H. L. star, at the helm, while Steve Vair, pilot of one Allan Cup winner, is holding the reins over the Wolverines, and Perc Nicklin, a shrewd general handling the Moncton six.

Although the definite lineups of neither team has as yet been announced it is probable that Charlottetown will use in the opener "Daddy" Bubarr, former Fredericton net janitor in the cage, with Harold Gross, Tommy Oliver and Walter Ferguson forming the barrier; one attacking party will no doubt be composed of Jemmett, Kane and Schwab, while the second line may read Beaton, McArthur and Hudson.

Added to the above, Gardner has Jack Squarebriggs, Walter Lawlor, Steve Estabrooks and Hibbert Saunders, any of which may be called upon to step into the breach.

Perc Nicklin will send blond Jimmy Foster into the nets, with Len Burrage, Bill Gill and Bill Miller probably as the rear guard. Irvine, McDonald and Muckle are the probable starting line, with James, McManus and Connolly mentioned as the second sniping party.

Nicklin has in addition to these players Carroll, Cook, Webster, front liners, and Foster Woolley, an alternate defence man. He may use some of these in the first game.

## Carnera Stops Santa In 6th

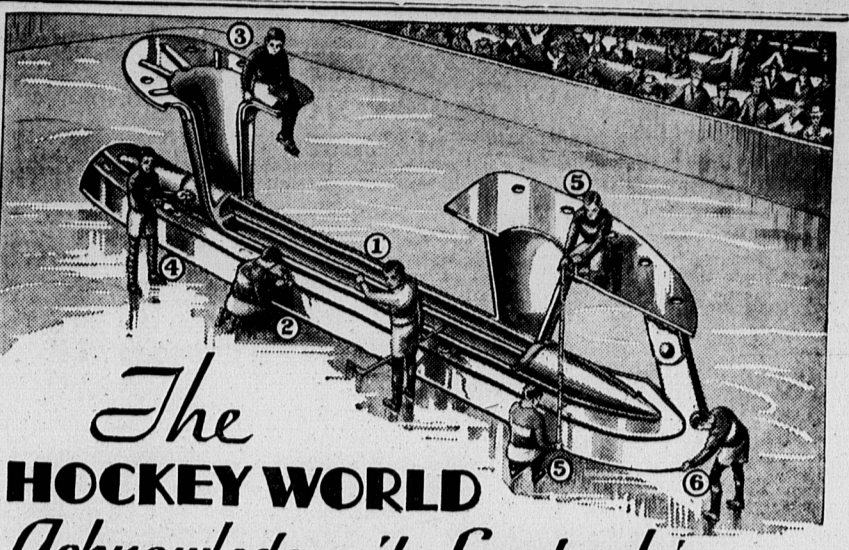
MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Nov. 20.—A quarter of a ton of human beef collided tonight in a unique spectacle of the boxing ring, and Primo Carnera won himself the Percheron title of the heavyweight division with a six-round technical knockout over Jose Santa.

The mammoth Italian, contributing 270 1-2 pounds to the entertainment, and the 247 pounds Portuguese giving away weight but not height to his Gargantuan foe, stamped and thundered until they raised clouds of resin dust, the ring creaked and boards seemed about to collapse under their feet, and Santa finally retired from sheer exhaustion and punishment.

Once in the second round again in the third, and finally in the sixth, the blackheaded Santa tumbled to the canvas with the crash of a falling oak, the first two times for counts of eight, the last time for nine.

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longer than the experts had expected the entire fight to go, but Santa put up a courageous, and at times powerful battle.
