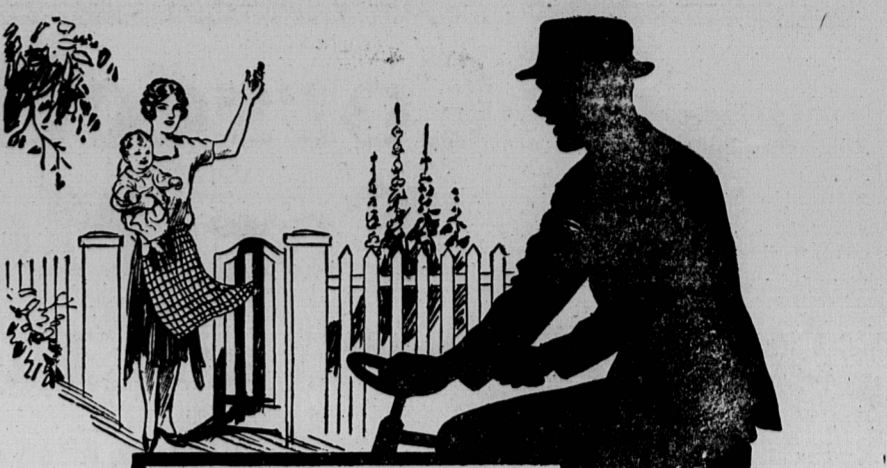

 Dear Mr. Fletcher:

It was with very sincere regret that the Official Board of our church recently received your resignation as Organist and Choir Director, and it was only upon your assurance that the resignation was irrevocable that the Board reluctantly decided to act upon your request and agree to your departure.

With the conclusion of the services today your engagement as Organist and Choir Director comes to an end, and in a very few days you will leave us to enter upon your work at St. Thomas in Western Ontario. We cannot let you go without giving expression to the very great sorrow felt by all the members of our congregation at the parting. You have been with us for more than ten years, and throughout the whole of that period the relationship has been most agreeable; in fact as the years passed the bond of friendship became stronger, so that today we can truly say "Blest be the tie that binds".
