HALIFAX LAD DROWNED

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Dec. 8.—Pushing his five-year old brother about on a sled John "Buddy" Wilnot, 11 was drowned after the ice of Hubley's Lake broke under their combined weight. Struggling about in the icy water, the pair attracted the attention of Reg Hubley and the boys' father, who hauled the little tot out on the end of a pole but were unable to save the older boy. The body was taken from the water 10 minutes later, after it had been caught on the prongs of a rake.

PRACTICAL!

Still a third costume can be made by wearing the skirt with a top of black velvet made high at the neck with long, light sleeves and split down the back to add a touch of formality.

BELIEVES HAUPTMANN INNOCENT

New Jersey Detective Reasons Case As a "Thrill Slaying."

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 8.—Governor Harold G. Hoffman defended his inter-visit to Bruno Richard Hauptmann, convicted murderer of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., today by stating it was his duty as a member of the New Jersey Court of Pardons "to make sure that justice is done." In a statement which answered criticism of his recent visit to Hauptmann's death cell, the Governor said the celebrated case "is one with which the dimensions of American justice will be measured by all Americans and by the world."

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 8.—(A.P.)—The Record, in a news story tonight said Ellis Parker, New Jersey detective, "has talked many times to the man he believes murdered the Lindbergh baby."

"Parker reasons it was a 'thrill slaying.' The suspect, Parker says, is much too wealthy to have committed the crime for money. 'Parker said his deductions so impressed Governor Hoffman, who he says called him into the reopened case, that the New Jersey Governor assigned a personal attaché, Hoffman's private payroll, to aid Parker's investigation."

"Parker's suspect lives in New Jersey and can be arrested at any time, the detective said. 'The man is middle-aged, respected and never had a criminal record, the sleuth added. 'Parker disclosed to the Record Saturday his belief that Hauptmann is innocent of the kidnap-murder and of the later collection of \$50,000 ransom from Col. Charles A. Lindbergh."

"He believes Hauptmann told the truth when he said he got the ransom notes from his friend, Isador Fisch, since dead in Germany. He reasons Fisch got the money from gangsters who convinced the Lindberghs they had the baby. 'Whatever there was no connection whatever between the abductors and the collectors of the ransom."

Freighter Limp Towards Halifax

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Dec. 8.—The British freighter Salmonpool, reported in difficulties 300 miles south of Sable Island Saturday has made temporary repairs and is proceeding on her way, the salvage tug Foundation Franklin reported on her return to Halifax. The ocean-going tug was in communication with the freighter after she reported to the East Coast Radio Signal Service here Saturday that she had lost her steering gear. The Salmon, a 4,803 ton craft, was bound for the United Kingdom from Norfolk when she ran into trouble. She was built in 1920 for the Pool Shipping Company, managed by the Sir R. Roper Co., Ltd.

88 Killed In Snow Avalanche

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MOSCOW, Dec. 8.—Eighty-eight men, women and children were killed in a snow avalanche which buried two community dwellings at Kirovsk at the foot of Mount Yuzor on the Kola Peninsula inside the Arctic Circle, it was learned today. The disaster occurred last Thursday after a heavy snowstorm. Only meagre details of the disaster were contained in dispatches reaching Moscow today. The wall of a third dwelling was demolished, and a railroad locomotive overturned, but virtually all the victims were trapped in the two buildings that were destroyed. Two thousand relief workers extricated 47 persons, all badly injured, from under the snow. Three died soon afterward. Medical supplies, clothing and food were rushed from surrounding points. A committee was sent from Leningrad to investigate the disaster. The government voted 300,000 rubles for families of the victims, who were buried Sunday.
