ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

A telegram received yesterday by W. W. Clark, agent for the Manchester Commerce, states that the steamer sailed from Montreal at 12.30 and is due in Charlottetown on Sunday night.

DEFINITE word has been received from Dr. Oronhyatekha, who has just returned to Toronto from Europe, that he will be present at the High Court of New Brunswick to be held in St. Stephen on August 5th and also at the High Court of Prince Edward Island which meets in Tignish on August 7th.

On Monday evening the spiritual Retreat for the clergy of the diocese of Charlottetown will be commenced at St. Dunstan's College and will continue until the following Saturday. The spiritual exercises will be conducted by the Rev. Neil N. MacKinnon, S. J., Rector of St. Ignatius Loyola church, New York. Father MacKinnon is a native of Grand River, Lot 14, and was one of the first students to enter the present St. Dunstan's College. He will arrive in Charlottetown on Saturday, and will preach in the Cathedral at 10.30 Mass on Sunday.

A MAN named Ignatius Roach of Southport, while driving along Prince Street yesterday afternoon was thrown from his carriage receiving a painful cut upon his head. Those who saw the accident state that Roach's horse became unmanageable on Kent Street and when turning the corner of Kent and Prince Streets the carriage was upset, one of the wheels passing over Roach's chest. Dr. McLaughlin was sent for and he was removed to the Doctor's office where his wounds were dressed. The horse was captured near the Lyceum.

WORD has reached this office of a suspicious looking character, pretending to be deaf and dumb, who went through the eastern part of the province a short time ago asking for help. He gave the name of Albert Brown of Halifax. He is of medium size, height about 5 ft. 6 inches, fair complexion, clean-shaven, bald head about 40 years of age, dressed in dark blue and wore a blue cap. It is stated that in some of the houses he visited several stereopticon views were mislaid and on being followed he opened his valise and returned them to the owners.

On Tuesday last Alexander McPherson of Kinross had an experience which he will not forget for some time. After leaving the city for his home he overtook a man walking and gave him a lift along the road. After going for some distance upon the stranger's suggestion they went into a house where it was decided to feed the horse. When the oats were being secured for the animal Mr. McPherson became suspicious and when he went out he found that his horse and wagon were gone. Yesterday the animal was located on Baldwin's Road and it is understood that little difficulty will be experienced in bringing the thief to justice. In the wagon were a number of young pigs.

The Guardian has received the prospectus and course of studies of the scholastic year 1902-1903, St. Dunstan's College, as is well known is one of the first institutions of the province for the education of the youth of the province being founded during the Episcopate of Bishop McEachern. For forty-seven years this college has continued to prepare the clergy of the Diocese, and nearly an equal number who are prosecuting the duties of their sacred calling in the other provinces. The attainments of the College not only have elicited the praise of her own alumni, but also have merited in the most significant manner the esteem of the greater centres of education in the Dominion. This is especially apparent from the close relation existing between this College and Laval University, Quebec. The prospectus is beautifully illustrated with cuts of the college, play ground showing section of bicycle track, and the interior of the skating rink, play ground etc.

Those interested in Mount Allison Ladies' College will be pleased to know the year's calendar exceeds anything yet published. Mount Allison Ladies' College was opened for the reception of students on Thursday August 17th, 1884. The constant object of all the officers of instruction is to impart an education which does not regard accomplishments merely, but which modifies the character and bestows the power of self-control, which will enable the possessor to enrich the genial atmosphere of home with calm and elevated enjoyments—an education which shall prepare the daughter, the sister, and the mother to exert a moral influence, the stronger always being associated with intellectual vigor. The calendar hand contains excellent cuts of the Ladies' College from Willow Avenue, the University residence, Mt. Allison Academy and Commercial College, Mt. Allison Conservatory of Music, Centre Gallery, Museum of Fine Arts, young ladies indulging in physical culture.

It is greatly to be regretted that wild mustard has become so plentiful throughout the country. This year fully one half of the grain fields contain some of the noxious weed. Many pull it up as fast as it appears; others are careless or perhaps do not understand its dangerous character and allow it to flourish undisturbed. The latter practice cannot be too strongly condemned. The weed should never be allowed to form seed, as in this way it produces itself very abundantly, it being estimated that a single average plant will yield 15,000 seeds. At this rate of increase a very short time must elapse before the mustard can obtain entire possession of the soil. It grows readily in any cultivated ground and may prove very injurious to grain and root crops. The seeds retain their vitality for a long time when buried in the soil making it a well nigh impossible task to get rid of the weed after it has once been allowed to ripen. It is an annual, and is reproduced from seed year by year. The flowers are yellow, showy, and about 3 inches broad. The pods which appear on the lower part of the stem whilst the top is still in flower, are from 1 to 2 inches long, and have a 'knotted' appearance. The seed is black, perfectly spherical and very much like rape or turnip seed. When present only in small amounts as it is in most of our fields, hand pulling is the best means of eradicating it. It is easily distinguished by its showy flowers and can be pulled out readily enough. A day or two will do the work now neglected, it becomes a curse to the soil. No amount of labor afterwards can be made to atone for present carelessness in this regard. Wild mustard is among the worst weeds known in Canada and a great effort should be made to stamp it out in the beginning. It is hoped that in no case will it be allowed to grow unmolested. Everyone should seek to destroy it by all means possible. E. J. Macmillan, Sec. of Agriculture.
