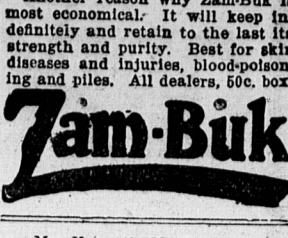

TURKS MUST LEAVE CONSTANTINOPLE SAYS LORD CECIL

LONDON, Feb. 23.—In an article in the Evening Standard today Lord Robert Cecil gives it as his opinion that the Turks must leave Constantinople on the ground of the maintenance of Turkish sovereignty over that city would be a "menace to tranquility."

MENTAL DEFECTS FOUND AMONG TORONTO PUPILS

TORONTO, Feb. 23.—In eleven public schools of Toronto, Dr. C. K. Clarke, medical director of the Canadian National Committee of mental hygiene, has found 352 pupils with an intelligence quotient of less than eighty per cent. and out of 122 defectives below seventy per cent., 100 are possessed of the characteristic stigma of degeneration. Dr. Clarke has investigated these schools at the request of the Toronto board of education, and has recommended the segregation of low grades be effective in two or more centrally located schools.

FARMERS PARTY CANDIDATES FOR NEXT ELECTION

WINNIPEG, Man., Feb. 23.—The Winnipeg Free Press says: "At least six, perhaps twelve Farmers' party candidates will be nominated and will contest constituencies at the provincial elections next summer. It was announced today from a source which is in close touch with the Farmers' political game. These candidates will profess allegiance to neither Premier Norris nor R. G. Willis, leader of the opposition. If elected, and the Free Press informant declared that he felt no doubt on this matter, the Farmer members will maintain strict independence in the house." On March 8, it said a drive for funds will be started with an objective of \$300,000, of which about \$200,000 will be for organizing.

FISH BY THE MILLION

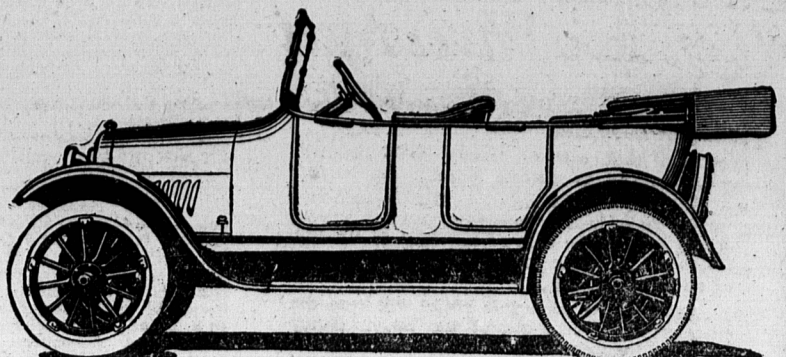
Evidence that the most enthusiastic amateur fishermen pitifully lacking in imagination compared with the confirmed statistician, is provided by Captain F. W. Wallace, of Montreal, writing in the Journal of the Canadian Bankers' Association. Where his amateur rivals deal in ounces, Captain Wallace speaks calmly of hundreds of millions of pounds.

"According to the latest available statistics," he says, "the value of Canada's fisheries amounted to \$22,350,000" (for the year 1917). "Of this amount, British Columbia claims a fishery value of \$21,518,596, or 41 per cent. of the total. The annual value of the fisheries in the other Provinces are as follows:

One of these four prolific fishing areas Canada is singularly fortunate in having two adjacent to her Atlantic and Pacific coasts, and is thus endowed with the greatest fishery resources in the world."
