The programme will definitely conclude not later than 4:00 P.M., and should the weather prove unfavourable, all phases of the programme will be conducted under cover.

ALCOHOL QUIZ

3. How does alcohol affect the blood? It causes the blood corpuscles to shrivel up and become star-shaped, so that they cannot build up the body with oxygen and food; or convey the waste material to the lungs. The body is thus ill-nourished and poisoned. Alcohol also causes the blood vessels or tubes to become hard and brittle, thus causing the danger of the blood bursting through the fine tubes and causing serious harm.

4. How does it affect the white corpuscles? The white corpuscles are the defenders of the body. Alcohol weakens them so that they do not so quickly or effectively fight against poison germs.

5. How does alcohol cause further injury to the body? It hardens and clogs the lung cells so that they cannot supply oxygen so well to the blood or receive from the blood the carbon dioxide, to breathe out from the body.

It hardens food so that the work of the stomach is increased and digestion is hindered. It paralyzes the nerves, weakens the muscles, causes disease of the liver and kidneys and injures every part of the body.

Beer parlors could become a pitfall for many fine promising Nova Scotians.
