

Heavy P. E. I. Poultry Shipments To U. S. A.

The poultry and egg markets are quite active and prices have advanced on both eggs and live poultry, reports Major F. M. Nash, senior poultry products inspector. Paying prices to producers of Grade A Large and Grade A Medium eggs have advanced three and one-half cents per dozen and live fowl from one to two cents per lb.

Shipments of live fowl to the United States continue. Demand for the product is strong and dealers are paying for healthy fowl five pounds and over 26-27 cents per lb.

There were approximately eight to ten thousand birds moved across the border during the past week from Prince Edward Island. A feature of the market last week was the shipment of three thousand birds in a live poultry palace car. Several years ago, it was the practice in this Province to load these live poultry cars for shipment to Boston. In later years this was discontinued due to the increased duty placed on this product during the war period.

With the recent opening of the American market to Canadian poultry and the advent of poultry trucks, this method of transporting again came into existence though it is not considered by many as being as economical as the live poultry cars. In trucking the stock is not fed from time of receipt until arrival at destination whereas with the live poultry cars the birds can be continuously enroute thereby cutting down shrinkage.

Lower Egg Receipts
Operators of registered egg grading stations report receipts lower by some five per cent than last week. Quality for the season of 1947, however, with the advent of recent warm weather, undergrade eggs are rapidly increasing.

Requests have been received from grading station operators to give publicity to the production of quality eggs can be produced in warm weather by judicious feeding, proper care of the product and frequent marketings. In warm weather, eggs should be collected at least three or four times daily when they should be placed in a cool room in order to remove the animal heat as quickly as possible to retain quality. These eggs should be kept in a cool place until ready for market. It is suggested that eggs be marketed twice weekly. It behooves all producers to follow the above practice when it is considered that today there is a difference of fourteen cents a dozen between the paying price of Grade A Large and Grade B eggs.

The demand for eggs throughout the Maritimes has been so great that our entire output of Grade A eggs has been moving to these points," Mr. Nash said. The Maritime Provinces today are more or less a deficiency area with the result that the shipping of eggs to the Special Products Board has been discontinued for the present.

Current Prices
Paying prices for ungraded eggs have advanced and operators of registered egg grading stations are quoting producers: A Large 46 1-2, A Medium 44 1-2; B 33; C 18-22. Country grading stations are receiving for the graded pack for station: A large 51; A Medium 49; B 38.

Wholesalers are quoting retailers for the cartoned product. A Large 55; B (loose) 40. Dressed poultry: Chicken, mixed A 32; B 25; C 15.
