Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

The Unwritten Law

The "unwritten law," whereby a man may kill his wife's seducer, was recognized by an English jury recently for the first time within the recollection of the English public. "Justifiable homicide in self-defence," was the verdict rendered by a London jury in the case of Lieut. Douglas Malcolm, who shot and killed a foreigner, Anton Baumburg, styling himself "Count Deborch."

Lieutenant Malcolm, who was a wealthy young merchant before the war, returned on leave from France and found his wife with the so-called Count. He attacked the "count" and afterwards challenged him to a duel, but the "count" ignored the challenge. Malcolm visited the "courts" London lodgings and other lodgers testified to hearing a struggle, followed by a revolver shot. They found the "count" dead.

After leaving the premises Malcolm surrendered to the first policeman he met. He testified before the coroner's jury relative to Deborch's actions, but did not suggest self-defence in killing the man. Malcolm's wife admitted her delinquency. It developed that Deborch was for a brief period in service with the officers' training corps, but that he was under police suspicion of being an international spy and was listed by the police as a professional spy.

PAPER STRINGS IS NOW BEING USED.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—"Paper string is being used for commercial purposes everywhere now," says a report of the Board of Trade. "Even tissue paper can be used in its manufacture. With regard to textiles, paper is being used for making sacks for commercial use in place of burlap, and these have been found to equal the former sacks in every way."

Paper shoes are being manufactured on a small scale in England, the paper being used for the uppers. The material is platted paper closely woven, somewhat similar to that used in the manufacture of paper hats. Paper fibre is also used in making a cheap grade of imitation felt hats for men.

Discussing the measures taken during the past year by Germany to deal with the growing shortage of clothing, the Board of Trade Gazette says: "Much of the clothing now worn throughout Germany, including military uniforms is made from materials diluted in varying degrees with substitutes such as paper and cellulose, the warmth and wearing qualities of which are doubtful as compared with materials spun, woven or knitted wholly from wool and cotton."

1,000,000 PEOPLE HOMELESS IN CHINA

PEKING, Oct. 21.—The Associated Press correspondent has just completed a two weeks' boat and overland tour of the flooded sections in Shantung, Honan and Chi-Li provinces, and found that the breaks in the Yellow River were comparatively unimportant, and contribute only slightly to the torrent in the Grand Canal which keeps Tien-Tsin under water. There is no danger of the Yellow River resuming its old channel. The correspondent went by boat over thousands of ruined villages, and visited many isolated refuge camps.

Homeless and penniless. There are at least 1,000,000 persons homeless and penniless, and probably 25,000 square miles of territory have been devastated, with the crops gone and the land still submerged. There has been a great loss of life among the old, small-footed women, who were unable to reach the high lands.

The torrential rains for six weeks never before were equalled in volume for the last fifty years. The rains caused floods that even submerged districts away from the streams. Work Animals Gone. The correspondent saw whole families dragging ploughs and endeavoring to plant winter wheat on the dry knolls. The work animals have been drowned, sold, or eaten, and the money lenders refuse loans until the land is dry again and planted.

The inundated Chi-Li plain is still pouring flood water through the Grand Canal into Tien-Tsin, where the water is stationary. The American Red Cross is erecting huts for

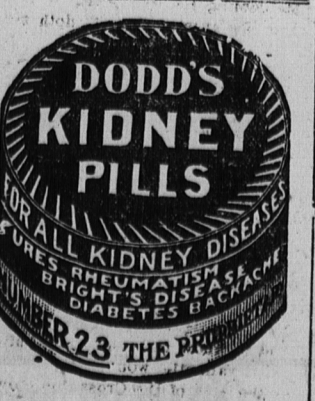
