CATHOLIC ACADEMY BURNED.

BAY CITY, Mich., March 13.—Holy Rosary Academy, in Essexville, was destroyed by fire at midnight, entailing a loss of \$26,000; insurance, \$12,000. Thirteen sisters and forty-five children were in the institution. Sister Alexia jumped from a second story window, sustaining a fracture of the right leg and other injuries that may result fatally. Three others were badly hurt.

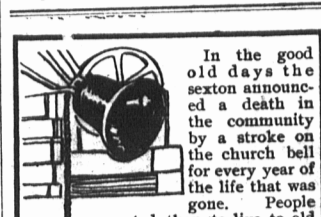
DURATION OF THE WAR.

The British newspapers are not indulging in predictions as to the length of the war, but the military correspondents of The Standard, The Mail and The Telegraph do not see how the military situation can be cleared for months to come. The Russian press intimates their expectation of a protracted struggle. One of them, the Viedomosti, very strongly anti-British, is quoted as saying, "The war is certain to be protracted unless France should be induced to forget the lost provinces and join Germany and Russia in punishing England's treachery." In France there is also the expectation of a long war. The Figaro says: "What is the use of self-deception? There is every reason to fear, in view of the present situation, that the war will last a long time. Nor is this a vain prognostication, an airy apprehension. It is an observation dictated by common sense, based on the more or less complete success of the Japanese at the outset."

Other journals point out that initial success in war is by no means a sure indication of the final result. The Southern States in the United States civil war of forty years ago gained distinct success at the beginning, but were conquered in the end. At the outset of the war in South Africa the Boers swept everything before them, only to lose all at the last. The continental journals nearly all of whom are sympathetic with Russia, claim that it is the Muscovite policy to exhaust their enemy by retiring slowly before him at the first, always strengthening their bases in the rear, leading the Japanese far from their present bases and then crush them by superior force. The Pester Lloyd, published in Buda Pest, says "the history of all wars in which Russia has been engaged shows that she protracts them. If she is unable to do that she always suffers defeat. . . . At the outbreak of war a Russian army never comes well out of a test." This journal thinks the determination of the Russians to fall back before the Japanese is a bad omen for the latter.

There is in France apparently a very considerable fear that not only will the war be prolonged, but that complications may arise. The Petite Republique of Paris denounces the dual alliance between France and Russia, and demands to know its exact terms. This journal asks, "Is France obliged to support Russia in case Great Britain intervenes in Japan's favor? . . . Is the France of the great revolution to follow autocratic Russia in all her adventures?" The Paris Figaro on the other hand, declares that Britain after centuries in which she was jealous of France is now jealous of Russia, "and refuses to see that Russia is the rampart of Europe. . . . Let us suppose that Japan makes an appeal to her ally, Great Britain, for aid, and that in consequence, there comes an appeal from Russia to her ally, France—what would happen if we

were guilty of the fault of evading our obligations? The answer is only too ready. On that very day we should see a

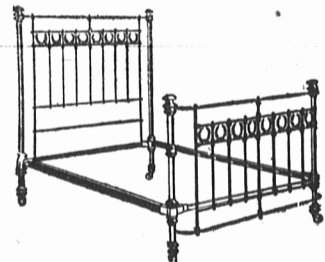
