It is reported that she has made contracts for marten and fisher with the object of bringing them back to Norway for ranching. Her visit here it is understood that it is with the object of comparing the quality of the animals with those produced on Norwegian Silver Fox farms and also as a probable purchaser. Mrs. Jakhellan is a keen judge of fur bearers and was considered such away back in 1924 when she came here to buy live foxes. Great progress has been made in the industry there, she says, and the total output of the Scandinavian countries this year will be well over 200,000 pelts.
