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Siki Must Be Good For Nine Months

PARIS, Dec 2—Battling Siki, who won the world's light-heavy-weight boxing championship from Georges Carpentier but recently lost it and also was denied the privilege of fighting, by the ruling of the French Boxing Federation because of alleged unseemingly conduct, may have a new license to box "after nine months of good behavior."

This information is contained in a letter sent by the Federation to Henry Pate, Under-Secretary of State for Physical Culture. The letter was written in consequence of the debate in the Chamber of Deputies Thursday, when the Senegalese Deputy, Diagne, attempted to have an appropriation for physical education reduced because of the action of the Federation in penalizing Siki. Diagne's motion was defeated by a vote of 408 to 136.

St. Andrew's Day

After dinner addresses. (Continued from Saturday's Guardian.)
Ex-Chief James Pate.
Replying to the toast "The Land O' The Heather," Ex-Chief James Pate referred to Scotland as the greatest magnet of the world drawing yearly thousands of visitors from all parts of the globe to see its beauties, its cottages, castles and abbeys, and to hear its larks and linnets sing.
"We Scotsmen love the old land," he continued. "We love to climb its heather covered mountains, to travel through its moorlands, to sit by its rivers and by the banks and braes of Bonny Doon, or by the classic waters of Ayr, or tread the ground the Paisley Post-Tannahill wrote about:
"The sun has gone down on the lofty Ben Lomond,
And left the red clouds to pre-empt the scene."
Education and religion, the speaker described as the outstanding qualities that made Scotland. As a result of the Education Act passed centuries ago every parish was compelled to build a school house and provide a school master. Later on universities were built in the principle cities. Scotland stands high today in art, science, agriculture and shipbuilding. Sailing down the Clyde one may look to the right and left, and see the great ships on the stocks being built to sail over the seven seas. Not so very long ago this river was a mere brook and it is now one of the greatest rivers in the world—not in length or width, but commercially.

The speaker described among other scenes, Piltchery, the Soldier's Leap and the Loch Tunnel with the Loch in the distance and the mountains rising grand and wild. It was amid such scenes as this that Bruce saw the Highland army in its lengthened lines extend from the mountain top to its base. "Wallace" cried he, "these brave hearts deserve a more cheerful home." "They are happy in these wilds," returned Wallace. "Their flocks browse on the hills, their herds in the valleys; the soil yields sufficient to support its sons. Their luxuries are minstrel's songs, and the lips of their bride. Their ambition is satisfied with following their chief to the field. And their honor lies in serving their God and maintaining the freedom of their country." (Applause.)

Our Guests.

Following a song by Mr. Ding well the toast, Our Guests, was responded to by Rev. W. Orr Mullan and William McRae, ex-Chief of Police, Vancouver, and ex-Chief of St. Andrew's Society in that city.
Mr. Mullan in the course of an excellent speech, abounding in humorous stories, paid eloquent tribute to Scotland's contribution to democracy, her achievements in peace and war, and her glorious traditions. He deplored the fact that old Scotch music was dying out and strongly advocated group singing.

Mr. McRae gave a brief but witty response to his toast, referring to similar celebrations which he had attended in Vancouver. He had been honored by receiving a life membership in St. Andrew's Society.

The closing toasts "The Calcuttians" and "Our Host and Hostess" were proposed respectively by G.S. Inam, K.C., and he said, "It is an iniquitous pride, and if the St. Andrew Societies could knock this thing on the head it would justify their existence for another hundred years."

The next toast "The Lassies was ably responded to by Mr. D. Edgar Shaw.
