PLANS for future temperance campaign work were discussed at an important meeting yesterday of the Missionary Board of the Royal Templars of Temperance, a sub-committee of the Executive having in charge the propagation of the work of the order. Mr. W. W. Buchanan, who has been employed for three months as lecturer in Ontario, presented his report. He reported that his travels had revealed a state of apathy on the part of the people with regard to temperance matters. This was probably due to the lack of any real temperance issue being before the people. The board issued an official statement last evening, in which it was stated that there was a unanimous desire to re-engage Mr. Buchanan, and a resolution eulogizing his services was passed, but that he had decided to leave at once for the Northwest. The statement also said that the matter of a division among the temperance forces was not brought up at all. It was, however, stated by a member of the committee that the subject of receding from the Ontario Alliance has been discussed informally, but that the order as a body was not taking any part in the movement. The board also decided to commence an aggressive temperance campaign, which would not be confined to work among the societies. In fact they intended to take the lead in temperance work generally. To this end, it was proposed to employ two or three first class men as organizers and lecturers several names being now under consideration.—Toronto Globe—Mr. Buchanan's friends in Charlottetown will regret to learn of his retirement.
