The latest news, first of all.

The services in the Methodist Church, Summerside, tomorrow will be as usual. The pastor, the Rev. H. Johnson, will preach at 11 and 7.

Hugh Cork will address a union meeting at the Methodist Church, Summerside, tomorrow at two-thirty; and at the Presbyterian Church at eight p.m.

Dr. T. Grady and W. Wright, Summerside, were among the passengers leaving Summerside by the boat yesterday morning on route for Western Canada.

Summerside dealers, yesterday, were paying sixteen to eighteen cents a lb for butter, twenty cents a bushel for potatoes, twenty to twenty-one cents a dozen for eggs, eight fifty a ton for loose hay and four fifty for straw, thirty-eight to thirty-nine cents a bus for oats and twenty cents a lb for wool.

The following are the Alberton market prices:—White and black oats thirty-six and thirty-seven cents per bushel, butter eighteen cents per lb, eggs twenty cents per doz, wool twenty cents per lb, pork nine to nine and a half cents per lb and per ton (loose), eight to nine dollars per ton and hides per lb ten cents.

Leslie B. McMurdo, Newcastle, in tends to move westward in a few months and is selling out his clothing business. Alderman McMurdo is a native of P. E. Island, came here some ten or twelve years ago and has built up a good business. He has three or four times been elected to the town council with a large vote and has been chairman of the board of works, and is now chairman of the police committee, and has been considered as the most likely candidate to win the mayoralty election next spring should he then be in the town. He is very popular among the citizens and his early departure will be much regretted.—St John Times.

The remains of the late Captain Dunn, who died so suddenly at Free-town, were brought to Summerside, by the mail train, yesterday morning. The funeral will take place from his late residence at two o'clock on Sunday.

The funeral of the late Charles McFarlane, Fernwood, will take place from his late residence at 2 p. m., today, to the North Bechuque Cemetery. There will be a short service at the house and the general service will be held in the church.

The funeral of the late Miss Evans Sherbrooke, took place from the home of George Pickering, Thursday afternoon, and brought together a very large gathering of people. Rev Mr Webster was the officiating clergyman, assisted by the Rev Mr Nicholls Kensington.

Word has been received by friends in Summerside, of the death of Nellie Shaw, only daughter of George Shaw, formerly of St Eleanor's and now of New York City. About a year ago Miss Shaw's health began to fail and she was advised to go to Colorado, where she died on the 8th inst. Her father was with her and will convey the body to New York for burial beside her mother, who died and was buried there a little over a year ago. Miss Shaw was 26 years of age and leaves six brothers to mourn the loss of a loving sister, besides her father.

Poplar Grove has lost one of its oldest residents in the person of Mrs John Craig who passed peacefully to rest Sept 21st, 1909, at the advanced age of nearly eighty-eight years. A daughter of the late John Ramsay of Rosehill, Lot 16, she there spent her early life, brought up in the midst of truly Christian influences and surroundings. A firm adherer to the right, ever seeking and following in the path of Christian rectitude, her whole life was a shining example of one lived within the shadow of the Cross. Her husband whom she married in 1850, died in 1895. In 1869 she moved with her husband and family from Bechuque to Lot 11, and there spent her declining years. To the last she retained all her faculties unimpaired and was bedfast but a few months, yet without pain or ache.
