We had a visit from Alfie Webster, Marie, yesterday afternoon and quizzed him concerning the speed prospects he has at his home. He said that Quinia 2:04 1/4 is in wonderful shape this spring having been driven all winter by Walter McEwen, Lot 40, who liked her very much and gave her exceptional care. Three as a yearling get are in Alfie's barn, a yearling by Dillington 2:13 1/4, a three-year-old by Kalmuck 2:15 1/4, and a two-year-old by Al Worthy 2:15 1/4. The two latter are entered in the futurities which will be raced this season.

Alfie has another speed prospect that he likes very much called Ethel Dillon, a big five-year-old 1:20.00 pound trotter sired by Longset 2:03 1/4, out of Daisy Todd. She was bred by Arthur Reeves, Sydney, N. S., and received a very small amount of training as a three-year-old. "She can trot a storm and I intend to give her some training after we put in the crop," said Alfie.

In the same vicinity there is a two-year-old Al Worthy owned by Robert Blackett, Midge, that is one of the most beautiful in King's County. It is out of Emma Azoff that Dr. F. W. Christopher, Boston, brought down here a license to produce good ones as she is well-bred and could trot very fast as a two-year-old, being second in a 1:20.00 stake. She has this year foaled to Dillington 2:13 1/4. Congratulations, Mr. Blackett. We will be hearing from you after a while and perhaps cheering for you.

Frank Patch 2:06 1/4, died last week at Halifax and was buried in the infield at the Exhibition grounds; a fitting resting place for the great pacer who won so many victories over that track and looked around so proudly on those occasions at the admiring thousands who cheered him.

Frank Patch was purchased as a four-year-old by Adams and Mitchell from parties in Indiana. He had no record, or at least no fast record, at the time, but had demonstrated speed capacity of a high order. During the years that we knew him he was campaigned by Tommy Wombat and latterly by Frank Adams, son of one of the proprietors.

For years Frank Patch dominated the free-for-alls of the Maritime. He was a thick, thick horse with great chere development, excellent legs and feet and perfect manners. He could score away very fast and usually had the rail before the first turn was reached, then just sort of glanced back and took stock of his opponents, leading them by a length or two to the wire. He was a horse that took very little out of himself and was therefore a particularly nice one to drive or to watch performing. Halifax audiences were proud of him and a Frank Patch victory was always sure to be popular, while a defeat left them very cold indeed.

At the risk of being blamed for repetition we will again refer to the Free-for-All which we saw at Halifax in the fall of 1911 with Frank Patch 2:13 1/4, Spooney Boy 2:14 1/4, Vesta Boy 2:05 1/4, and the American pacer Banner B. 2:09 1/4.

The Yankee pacer was brought down from the U. S. to clean up the Maritime speculators, particularly the Frank Patch owners. Vesta Boy was owned by the Summerside Driving Club and handled by Danie Steele. On the afternoon prior to the race we visited Danie in company with a friend, and asked him how old Vesta felt. "He is O.K. boys, I advise you that buying some tickets on him." That evening the pool room was packed to capacity and tickets were being handed out as fast as they could be written. My friend said "Let's buy a few cheap ones on Vesta, Danie says he's good." "Not on your life," we remarked, "Danie is a born optimist and always bets on his horse, a winner." My friend picked up a lot of the two and three dollar to win fifty kind and others not so good.

Next day we again had a look at Vesta as he was being warmed up and Danie reiterated his faith

ROSS PREDICTS HE WILL K.O. MCLARNIN

FERRISDALE, N. Y., May 24—Barney Ross decided today, while the rest of his camp was going, that there was no use fooling around with this issue of Jimmy McLarnin and the welter-weight championship. "I've decided," he said as he exercised lightly, his major boxing chores over for the title match in the Polo Grounds Tuesday, "that I'll knock McLarnin out this time in about eight or nine rounds. I want to get him while he's fresh and there's no excuse. If I wait until the 12th or so, everybody would think I was taking advantage of him after he tired." This was the first time the Chicago youngster had made an outright prediction before any of his duels with McLarnin, already totaling two with each winning a 15-round decision.

McLarnin, five miles down the road at Swan Lake, boxed five rounds today with Frank Williams and Jimmy Martin, his sparring partners, still wearing a green wind-breaker in the ring. Inspectors from the New York State Athletic Commission put him on the scales and found him weighing 147 1/4 pounds, far more than he ever has before. Barney weighs about 140.

Comprehensive Review Of Activities Of Island Harness Racing Club

The following is a very complete report of the formation of the Prince Edward Island Harness Racing Club. The summer of the list of entries in the two, three and four-year-old Futurities which will be raced this year.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Gentlemen: In presenting this report of the doings of our Club during the first year of its existence we presume that it may not be out of place to touch briefly on the incidents that led to the organization of the Prince Edward Island Harness Racing Club.

Back in February 1933, two well-known horsemen, W. B. MacArthur and Gordon W. Dawson met on the "Straightaway" trotting stretch of Summerside Harbour ice to watch the manoeuvres and note the results of the horse races that were on that day being contested in an attempt to satisfy the sporting ambition of the owners, and as a diversion and amusement for the assembled spectators.

Needless to say both these men like a good race. But the general agreement in their enjoyments must not be construed to mean that they think alike in every detail. Each, on this meet, enjoyed his own idea of the value of the performers; each had his own idea of relative speed and action. Hence it may be believed that their readily expressed opinions did not always coincide; but 'twas only when it came to a question of the comparative speed of Bud Aubrey, owned by Mr. Dawson and Mr. MacArthur, Colonel Upton that a gentlemen's bet was wagered. This bet was, as you will see, the very starting point in the inauguration of our Club, as it exists today.

Messrs. J. P. MacPherson and J. O. Cobb whose names are familiar to the horse-racing fraternity, being race officials at this meet overheard the discussion, and quickened

ed with the idea of the sport which such a bet betokened resolved that plans should be formulated to bring about in a public exhibition a demonstration of the racing qualities of those promising yearlings.

In March 1933 they proceeded with this race-promoting project in mind, by interviewing Mr. Dawson whose willing assistance so favored the development of their plan that as a result on July 1st, 1933, a Two-Year-Old Futurity Race was organized with no fewer than 19 prospects in view.

The coists for the 2 year old Futurity were at this time only yearlings, but applications for their entries were duly recorded and all necessary first payments were made in good time.

In the bustle of every day business this Futurity Race project was for a time allowed to lag, until with the addition of some new sporting blood it was resurrected in the early Spring of 1934.

These three or four men had really undertaken something which was now about to take on new life and vigor. Earnest cooperation, following approval of their project, soon won to their ranks other horsemen who delight in good clean healthy sport.
