P. C. Executive Meets At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 4 - (CP) - The Progressive Conservative Party, at the conclusion of the 27th general election, has decided to take several steps to strengthen organization for the next federal election. Before the convention yesterday of a two-day meeting of the executive of the party's national association, it was decided to organize young people's groups as rapidly as possible; to recommend an increase in the representation of young Progressive Conservatives on the executive and to make a concerted drive for an increase in the membership of women's organizations.

A statement issued at the conclusion of the closed meetings said "assurances were given... that the important posts of national director and director of publicity would be filled in the near future." R. A. (Dick) Bell, former national director, has returned to private law practice since the election. C. J. Charters, former director of publicity, has returned to private business. It is believed that George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader, has several men in mind for the posts. There has been speculation that Russell Boucher, who resigned his Commons seat to make way for Mr. Drew's election after the party's leadership convention a year ago, would be appointed national director. Another mentioned is Roland Michener, former personal advisor to Mr. Drew. The executive voted confidence in Mr. Drew's leadership. Earlier, he was given a similar vote by supporters in the Commons. In the general election—the first fought by Mr. Drew—the party's membership in the Commons dropped from 69 to 41. The executive's statement said the "problems of the party were frankly and freely discussed" during its sessions. Date for the next annual meeting of the national association was fixed for April 17, 18 and 19, 1950.
