GENERAL PRAISE FOR LINLITHGOW AS NEW VICEROY

Young for High and Arduous Post He Takes Position in India in April With Full Confidence of British People.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—(C.P.)—Although world attention has been diverted from Indian affairs for the time being by the appointment of Lord Linlithgow as Viceroy to succeed Lord Willingdon, a topic of lively discussion. Informed opinion here and in India is unanimous in cordial approval of the choice of the new Viceroy.

Few men of the present generation have worked harder and less in the limelight than Lord Linlithgow. In outward appearance he is the British aristocrat at his best—no small asset for one who is undertaking the Viceroyalty at so momentous a stage of Indian history. The Hope family has given to the state, over several generations, judges, soldiers, sailors and administrators. Lord Linlithgow's great-grandfather was one of Wellington's generals. His father, who was the first marquis of Australia, Governor-General of Australia.

Succeeding to the title and estates in 1908 at the age of 21 Lord Linlithgow married three years later, and served with distinction in the War. In his early political days he filled the posts of Deputy Chairman of the Conservative party and Civil Lord of the Admiralty. Leaving politics for a while he became a director of several city companies. Later he was for two years chairman of the Royal Commission on Indian Agriculture.

Politicians of all parties were impressed with his single-mindedness when he declined the tempting offer of the chairmanship of the Conservative party on the ground that his work for a more or less obscure commission on Indian agriculture was "far more important."

Agriculture and India are his special subjects. His handling of the selected committee which reviewed the Indian Report is said to have been marked by tact as well as by firmness.


With the ministry of Baldwin—under a new mandate—it is certain that the new Viceroy will have the complete confidence of the government at home when he goes to India in April. It is no secret that some Viceroy within the last 20 years or so have not enjoyed that confidence, and that at times there has been a regrettable lack of touch between Delhi and Whitehall.

Horses Paying Big Dividends

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—Real bargains among the turf's ranking thoroughbreds are few and far between, but at least 10 horses, including the great Discovery, fall in that category this year.

Although Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt paid \$20,000 for Discovery as a two-year-old, the famous chestnut son of Display has earned his oats many times over. As a juvenile, the 1935 handicap champion, holder of two world records, was not much but last year he picked up \$49,555 while trailing Cavalcade through most of the season. He was even greater this year, winning \$102,544, the majority of it in piling up eight straight victories.

The most notable bargain of the season, however, was Amcar, the former jumper which young Fred Alger, Jr., of Detroit acquired for \$7,500. The gelded son of Altesius, Irish-bred and with a Spanish name, rolled up a grand total of \$117,950 largely because of his victory in the \$100,000 Santa Anita Handicap.

A. Baron's Top Row, the little speedster that broke Discovery's winning streak in the Narragansett special and then repeated the victory in the Massachusetts Handicap at Suffolk Downs, also rates near the top. The California sportsman claimed the son of Fenuts for a mere \$3,500 in 1934. Since Jan. 1, he has won \$93,120 and ranks with Discovery as the one to beat in the 1936 Santa Anita Handicap. King Saxon, rated as greatest of the year's milers, Identity and Good Gamble, stablemates of Discovery, the Canadian-owned Stand Pat and Roman Soldier also have proved rare bargains among the older horses.

C. E. (Pat) Knebelkamp acquired the king as a two-year-old for \$2,500. He returned \$38,010 to his Kentucky owner's pocket. Young Vanderbilt picked up Identity out of a claiming race for \$3,500 last year and the \$29,065 with the three-year-old before he went wrong at Saratoga. He also paid only \$4,500 for Good Gamble yet the filly earned \$35,985.

Will Investigate Fishery Problems

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 30.—(C.P.)—H. R. Brookes and E. R. Watkinson of Enquiry into the Sea Fisheries of Newfoundland and Labrador, Sir John Hope Simpson, Commissioner for Natural Resources told the 118th meeting of the Commission of Government. The third member of the commission will be chosen by the fishermen.

The investigation is to be held to enquire into existing conditions of the Sea Fisheries of Newfoundland and Labrador, other than the seal fishery. Particular attention will be given to methods, conditions and costs of supplies of all kinds to the fisherfolk.

ARE MEN WILLING TO SUPPORT HOST OF FEMALE RELATIVES?

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—Miss Charl O. Williams, of Washington, D.C., president of the U. S. Federation of Business and Professional Women, suggested today that before furthering any move to force women who marry or have babies to give up jobs the opposite sex should ask itself:

"Are modern men willing to resume the task of supporting a host of female relatives—grandmothers, maiden aunts, grownup daughters, about-to-be-divorced sisters with children, mothers-in-law as well as wives?"

"Even if men should want to assume the financial responsibility of their women relatives, and possibly their wives' relatives too," she added. "Could they earn enough to do it?"

Miss Williams said she had protested to Gov. James Curley of Massachusetts against the proposal by a mill in Salem to dismiss women who married or married women who had babies.

Quiet Children Must Be Watched Warns Professor

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Nov. 30.—(C.P.)—"The too well-behaved, withdrawn, quiet child in the classroom is in greatest danger of permanent maladjustment to society in adult life," Prof. C. A. Krug of Mount Allison University, Sackville, N.B., told the Saint John Teachers' Association during an address on mental hygiene.

"A child is not like an adult, nor can it be expected to act like one," he declared. "It is one of the first laws of human growth that the child shall learn to be a mature and responsible adult by being an immature and irresponsible child."

"It is a calous lie to describe school days as the happiest days of life. Children's fears and distresses are tremendously real and more important than anything in the school curriculum. During school days in the period of growth and greatest stress and strain, the child has to make rapid adjustment to a world he rarely understands."

Entering school six years old the child was making his first independent adventure and encountered two worlds—the adult world represented by the teachers and the world of playmates, said Prof. Krug. When the child lost out in one of these worlds he tried to compensate himself by superiority in the other. Like adults the child reacted to an adverse situation by attacking it or withdrawing. Symptoms of attacking were temper, disobedience, over-activity, truancy and refusal to cooperate. Withdrawing or "self-breaking" was evidenced by fear, sickness, over-sensitiveness, shyness, solitude and dependence on adults.

These were symptoms of the child trying to realize for himself and pointed only to normal adjustment unless they became ingrained habits and attitudes. When successful adjustment was made the attacking tendency produced the athlete, the business leader, the reformer and, in the extreme, the revolutionary.

From the withdrawing reaction, when successfully experienced, emerged literary and artistic achievement. Both types must be dealt with by the teacher, and evasion of them was an evasion of responsibility to the school and to the child, declared the professor.

He was tired of hearing about the evils of discipline and the danger of repression. The making of character had to begin with repression and discipline. "Be a disciplinarian and a good one," was his counsel to the teachers. "Study to discover the minimum of regulation necessary for class routine at the level of maturity the child has reached and see to it that that minimum of regulation is enforced impersonally and impartially. Try to find out the thing behind the

Jamaica Imposes Tax on Tourists

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Nov. 30.—(C.P.)—Having just taken a step in the other direction, Jamaica is watching closely the effects of Cuba's action in cancelling the tax formerly collected from tourists.

Under the dictatorship of Machado three years ago, Cuba imposed a tax of \$3 on each tourist entering the republic. Supporting vigorous protests, several tourist liners deleted Havana from their itineraries.

During the revolutions the number of cruise ships calling at Cuban ports was reduced to a minimum and when government officials finally were given a chance to get down to business they found the republic had suffered serious revenue losses from the absence of tourist trade.

In order to revive the once lucrative industry, the government yielded to the complaints of Havana's National Commission on Tourists and cancelled not only the head tax on visitors but also port dues formerly collected from all passenger vessels calling at Cuban ports.

Jamaica had hardly imposed her tourist tax when she learned that Cuba had cut it out. Meanwhile the government here had received protests from various steamship lines, followed by announcements from some of them that Kingston had been taken off their cruise lists.

offence. Be a disciplinarian with understanding."

Telling of replies from 500 teachers regarding their views on the most serious trials in school children, he noted that the teachers held opinions exactly opposite to those of child guidance experts.

These experts knew that the child of withdrawing and recessive behaviour was no trouble in the classroom but was escaping from the real world and setting goals he could never attain. He was the potential alcohol or drug addict, the religious fanatic, the insanity case or, in the extreme, the suicide.

Teachers wrongfully encouraged the quiet, retiring child to continue this attitude, he asserted. They were "lying when they say there is always room at the top, and the child who held 40th place had probably striven just as hard and perhaps was more deserving of the teacher's commendation."
