BOARD OF TRADE.—The apathy of a few years back in the many local boards of trade has as a rule given place to a great revival of interest under the incentive of the Maritime Board, and also due to trade improvement and healthy state of industrial pursuits. Old boards that were languid are re-organizing, new boards are being formed, and getting to work utilizing local advantages seeing the success of their neighboring towns; under the influence of a good live board of trade. This is a most encouraging feature for the future of the Maritime Provinces, as well as a support to the Maritime Central Board which has long since passed its experimental stage as was indicated by the annual meeting in St. John last year. New boards of trade have been organized at Yarmouth, Bridgetown, Summerside, Canning, Digby, Annapolis, Liverpool and other towns will soon have theirs. Of the thirty five local boards in the provinces about thirty are affiliated with the Maritime. One of the most important subjects that has confronted the Maritime Board in the past few years was how best to promote a revival of our shipping interests. It almost seems as if the near future will see steel shipbuilding carried on to a large extent. The railroads and steam boats and all transportation lines are arranging for the largest influx of visitors to the Maritime Provinces ever known, and every city or town that has a Board of Trade should be ready to point out that these provinces have great possibilities and serve tourists and visitors with a generous hospitality. It is expected that the next annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade to be held in Kentville, Nova Scotia, will be very largely attended, and that most of the local boards will send delegates. The Press of the various provinces are devoting a good deal of their space to board of trade work which is having good results.
