TYRIAN IN PORT.—On Saturday at 5 o'clock the S. S. Tyrian, commissioned to lay two cables, one between Wood Islands and Caribou Island, and the other between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, arrived from Halifax and berthed at the Marine wharf. The cables are for the Western Union Telegraph Company and F. B. McTearry & Co. It will take from ten to twelve hours to lay the first cable and about a week later they will be ready to lay the second. The steamer, an old Aculline liner, is in charge of Capt. Dickson, with Mr. McKinnon, as Pilot. She was built in the Old country; is 280 feet long overall, and of 780 tons net and 1,100 gross.
