JIM THORPE SEEKS JOB AS COACH OF ALMA MATER

CHARLESTON, Pa., Feb. 18.—Jim Thorpe, greatest and most authentic of the All-Americans, seeks to return to the scenes of his first triumphs, to this quiet Cumberland Valley town, where as one of Pop Warner's Indians he made his first bid for fame and glory.

Thorpe wants to come back to Carlisle in the capacity of a football coach to direct the gridiron destinies of Dickinson College, now representing the town in the collegiate athletic world.

While the acquisition of Thorpe would be a decided asset in nationwide advertising, it was considered unlikely that his application will be considered because of the one-year clause he has stipulated.

It was at Carlisle in the days of the government Indian school here that Thorpe started his athletic career that carried him into undying fame in football, a world's championship in the Olympic games and a professional football and baseball career.

A team-mate of Thorpe at the Indian school is also being considered for the coaching post vacated by the resignation of Red Griffith, former Penn State player. He is Gus Welch, an alumnus of Dickinson and former Indian star.

Application has been received, the college reports, from Paul Davis, captain here in 1907 and coach at Virginia recently; Alvin Julian, former head coach at Schuylkill-Albright, Reading; Sylvester Paultis, tutor at Bellefonte Academy, and Sol Wolfe, Williamsport High School coach who won the Pennsylvania state scholastic title for two successive years.

"No, No, Nanette," Is A Triumph Of Music, Color And Sparkling Comedy

In bringing the delightful musical comedy, "No, No, Nanette," to the talking screen First National has set a brilliant pace for other Hollywood Studios to follow. This lavish spectacle, made partly in simply gorgeous Technicolor, opened before an enthusiastic audience at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday.

The story—the comedy fable of a very unsophisticated millionaire who imagined he could buy clothes for pretty girls just out of pure good nature and get away with it—is very funny. The special scenic musical scenes, including dazzling trips to Holland, Japan, New York and Mars, are very, very beautiful. "Nanette" is mirthful, melodious, and produced with an artistry never excelled and rarely equalled in the annals of the screen.

It is impossible not to rave about the music. "King of the Air," the big song number, has a swinging, virile tune that will live for a long time. It is sung by Alexander Gray, the youthful leading man, in a way that will make it stick to your memory.

Other song numbers are "The Japanese Ballet," "The Dance of the Wooden Shoes," "Dancing on Mars," and "Pretending." They are all of the tuneful quality that causes you to whistle them while taking your morning shower or riding in the moonlight. "I Want to Be Happy" and "Tea for Two," hits of the original musical comedy.

Bernice Claire and Gray portray the leading roles very effectively. Miss Claire, a new personality from the stage, playing her first picture, will without doubt be one of the musical talkies' best bets hereafter. She has the youth, the beauty, the sparkle and the voice demanded for such roles. Gray, who was first heard in "Sally," is also a coming star if he maintains his present pace.

The comedy is upheld merrily by the clever Louise Fazenda and the Lucien Littlefield. Lilyan Tashman and Bert Roach are also prominent in the fun-making. Crystals Win Island Ch'Ship

Defeat Abegweits 5 to 2 In Sudden Death Game At Moncton Last Night.

MONCTON, Feb. 18.—The Summerside Crystals defeated the Charlottetown Abegweits here tonight in a sudden death game by a 5 to 2 score and won the championship of the Prince Edward Island Hockey League. The Crystals stormed through the Abbies in the first period to score twice; romped through the Charlottetown's for two more counters in the middle frame and held off the determined thrusts of the champions of a year ago in the third and scored another goal.

Make Desperate Bid

The Abbies sprang to life late in the first period to score one of their counters, and the other came in the final minutes of play and followed a last desperate bid for victory for the red and black, the colors which dominated Maritime hockey a few years ago. But there was only "Chick" Williams as a reminder of the once famous Abegweit team, which ruled the hockey domain of these provinces with an iron hand some eight years ago. The veteran who played a defence position tonight, turned in a sparkling performance, scored one of the Abbies goals and led countless attacks during the engagement.

Abbies Outplayed

The Crystals outplayed the Abbies tonight. With a steeper defence and a goalie that worked well, the Summerside squad forced the issue from the opening whistle and piled in two goals before the Abbies gained their "ice legs." The playing of Chick Gallant and Montgomery was outstanding, but the former was allowed practically a free hand to harass Stull from all angles.

Nicholson Off

Nicholson did not turn in his usual effective game and could do little with the hard and consistent skating of the Gallant boy of Summerside. Squarebriggs, playing centre for the ex-champions of the Island Province, was outstanding. He engineered play after play and gave his wings some fine openings, but the sturdy blocking of the Summerside defence and the goal tending of LeFurgy turned back all the Abbie assaults, except two.

Stull Caught

A special train conveying about two hundred Island fans arrived here tonight shortly after the start of the game and they gave the teams great support. An additional crowd of about two thousand fans from Moncton and vicinity were in the stadium for the big tilt, and got their money's worth in action.

Gallant Outstanding

From the face-off Squarebriggs raced through the Crystal defence for a close in shot at LeFurgy, but the goalie saved spectacularly. Chick Gallant was skating fast and harassed the Abbie defence with tricky stickhandling and fast skating. Shortly after the six minutes period, Chick Gallant raced down right wing, swerved as he hit the blue line, caught the Abbie defence out of position, spurted through and poked the disc between Stull's legs. The light failed to go on, but the referees blew the whistle. It was a pretty goal.

WILLIAMS GETS SMARF GOAL

Chick Williams gave the Charlottetown fans something to cheer about four minutes before the final song, when he grabbed Saunders' pass from the corner and blazed it past LeFurgy. His effort was offset thirty seconds later when the Abbie forward line was caught flatfooted inside the Crystals blue line, as Silliphant grabbed a loose puck and raced toward the Abbie goal. With only the defence man to pass, he circled the lone guard and passed the wafer to Schurman who was abreast of him and the latter scored without effort. The game was over so far as the scoring was concerned. The last few minutes were spent in a vain attempt by Abbies to crash the stubborn Crystal five man defence.

The Crystals will remain in Moncton until tomorrow when they will go to Amherst, where they will meet the Ramblers, Central League champions in the first game of a home and home series in the first round of the Maritime playdowns.

Red Cross News

Miss A.M. Price of Halifax, who has just returned from a four months' visit to England, has arrived in Charlottetown to conduct the Red Cross Corrective Clinics in the absence of Miss MacDonell who is holidaying in Toronto. Miss Price, who three years ago started this work of massage treatment for crippled children and other orthopedic conditions for the Red Cross, is being welcomed back to the city by her many old friends. She sees a tremendous improvement in the children who are still attending the clinic for massage, exercises or muscle training and was pleased to hear that others to whom she gave treatments before have been discharged as cured.

This Corrective Clinic held three times a week is part of the Red Cross programme for the treatment of handicapped children and carries on regularly between the big clinics held by Dr. Acker twice a year. The part that the masseuse plays in the correction of crippled cases is a very important one, because it is the persistent, patient training of paralyzed muscles, the teaching of control of weak ones and massage for strengthening them which helps in regaining of normal function and results in much of the improvement in conditions that require two years or more of time and steady work to correct.
