TELEGRAPHIC despatches from Halifax tell of the death of Capt. R. H. Cann, of Louisbourg. He was a well known seafaring man, and known to many people in the lower Provinces. His dead body was found in his room in the Burnham Hoop, Halifax, yesterday.

He is very well known in Charlottetown, and was very popular in athletic circles. He was a member of the Prince Edwards, and an old football player. He has two brothers in New Glasgow, N. S.

ON Nov. 28th John D. McLellan, Roxbury, formerly of Inverness Co., Capt. Breton, was married to Lettie Buntain, Boston, formerly of South Rustico, Prince Edward Island. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Alexander D. McKinnon B. D. at his residence in Boston Mass. The bridesmaid was Miss Bertha Frasher, Boston, and the groom was supported by his friend Dr. J. C. McPhail, Boston. The bride was becomingly attired in white china-silk and carried a large bouquet of bride's roses. After dining at the Hotel Plaza, with a few friends, the happy couple took the midnight train for New York, whence they will proceed to Philadelphia, where they will make their home.

The following, with reference to the tunnel under Northumberland Straits, appeared lately in the Boston Record: "Excitation in favor of the construction by the Canadian government of a tunnel under Northumberland Straits to connect Prince Edward Island with the mainland has been renewed here. The Island is sometimes cut off altogether from the mainland in winter. Two years ago the strait could not be navigated for two months, and as there was little hay on the Island cattle perished and the Island trade was almost paralyzed. A tunnel would go between Cape Traverse, P. E. I., and the north-east coast of Westmoreland County, N. B., where the strait is only about five miles wide.

NEWSPAPERS to hand contain further details of the death of Angus D. Martin, a son of Donald W. and Mrs. Martis of Valleyfield, in this Province, which took place at Hyde Park, Mass. He disappeared on the 20th October last. The body was found in the Neponset River on the 28th. He was a painter by trade and was 35 years old and unmarried. He had been living with his sister, Mrs. Alex. D. McPherson, and had two other sisters in Boston. His father and mother and brother still reside in Valleyfield. It seems that he deceased used to get off the train on the Hyde Park side of the river and would then walk on the tracks along the embankment to his work. He would be compelled to go around a narrow path between a wall and the edge of the bank, a very dangerous place, and is supposed to have fallen in, as it was dark at the time. The place has always been considered as perilous, and lives have before this been lost at the spot. Mr. McLeod was a member of the Clan McLeod, of Hyde Park, Mass., and the Clan has put on record resolutions of sympathy for his death. The father and mother of the deceased have also received a letter of sympathy from the Rev. W. A. Brown, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Hyde Park, of which the deceased was a member.

UNION DIVISION, S. O. T. has passed a resolution of sympathy and forwarded the same to the family of the late Peter Sinclair, condoling with them on the death of the head of the family, whom they recognized as a true friend of temperance. He had been a chartered member and the first W. P. of Union Division, and his loss was deeply felt by the members thereof. A similar resolution of condolence was also extended by Union Division to Ira and John McKay, whose loss of a loving mother is deeply deplored.

THERE was not a very large market yesterday, and the supplies on hand ranged high in price. Poultry was scarce, and almost prohibitive in price. The rain which set in yesterday morning, coming after the snowstorm, made very bad roads, especially where the snow had drifted deeply. A good deal of pork however was brought to the City, although the hauling of it was a difficult job. One farmer who came in from Cornwall with a fair load, had three upsets before reaching the City. The plows were very bad, the sleighs cutting right through the snow to the bare ground. The market for pork has become firm again, and yesterday the ruling prices were \$1 to \$1. The hogs being offered are of very good quality, and dealers profess themselves satisfied with the quantities offered.

AMONG the arrivals at the Eureka House, Water Street, are D. A. McIntyre and Fred Arsenault, who have been for some time employed in the Magdalen Islands, and are now on their way to Montreal. They arrived in this City on Monday morning, having come via Souris in the S. S. Amella. They arrived in Souris on Sunday morning during the storm, and so thick was it that they lay in harbor till two o'clock on Monday morning, not knowing where they were. They were in the Magdalens during the recent fire, which entailed the loss of the property of the Magdalen Islands Development Co. Messrs McIntyre and Arsenault have been chiefly engaged in the seal fisheries on the Island. The principal part of the catch is made in the spring when the ice is blown in upon the Islands, crowded with seals. On such occasions the fishermen go out and kill all the seals they can. At one time during last March about 40,000 seals came in at once, and out of these Mr. McIntyre bought about 20,000 from the people and shipped them to St. John's Newfoundland. This cargo was worth about \$28,000.

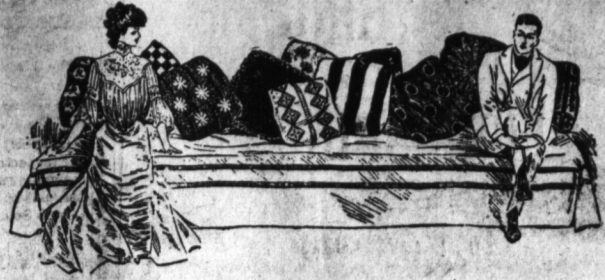
