VENDOR STORES

Sir,—The proposal that Vendor stores should be "prohibited" and closed is evidently the logical and reasonable conclusion to be drawn from the statements of some of the doctors and some of the prohibitionists. It is a thing to be banished altogether, and vendors stores for liquor should not be maintained or tolerated. They should be banished.

But we all know that this logical effect of the teaching of the members of the Temperance Alliance will not eventuate. We all know that alcohol is a good thing to use at certain times, in certain conditions, and in certain quantities prescribed by physicians, or supplied by persons who know how to use it so that it will do good. Men's lives have been saved by the prompt and reasonable use of whiskey or brandy; and if this town and province were to be visited by a contagion of small pox, there would be a rush to the vendor's store. Like other things, alcohol supply for the liquor that is needed and yet the Liquor Evil must be kept in check. The Government (this-is-to-be) will find it difficult to control the popular appetites for intoxicants. But they must continue to supply stores of liquor at which reasonable requirements may be met.

LIQUOR AND CARS

Sir,—According to the Prohibition Act (section 68) it is provided that "it shall be unlawful for any person under the influence of liquor or of any exhilarating or stupefying drink, to drive, operate or have charge of the power or guidance of any automobile, motor cycle or any motor vehicle, or of any horse, carriage or other vehicle upon any public road, highway, street, avenue, driveway or alley within Prince Edward Island." So there is a law against drinking liquor before taking charge of any kind of a car of carriage. But I have not heard that it has ever been acted upon. Our police and magistrates should see to it.

Grand Pre, made known to all the world in Longfellow's "Evangeline." And, in fact, this is one of the very spots which in the long ago was settled by Acadian refugees from that region who, when the British had taken possession of Nova Scotia hoped to live here in peace under the flag of France. One cannot, on remembering the sad plight to which these poor people later came, escape a feeling of regret that their hopes were vain, though there is no doubt that in the larger interests both of the Island and of Canada it was better so. Nevertheless, nothing can condone the harshness of their expulsion.

We round a bend in the road and a little ahead of us we see marking the entrance a mass of ever-changing color—the gay summer dresses of the women and girls who, with their men are come to this festival. And this is no common picnic. Standing out in its gray Aberdeen granite amid the riot of color and dominating by its serenity the laughing crowd like the peace of a holy benediction, is a great Celtic cross. At its base the inscription both in English and Gaelic, tells that it marks the site of the Mile log church raised by the Roman Catholic Highlanders who first set foot on Island soil near this place. Brought out and settled on his Tracadie estate by Captain John MacDonald, they arrived here on the ship "Alexander" in 1772. This place,
