## NEWS OF THE HORSES FROM ALL SOURCES

**ARTICLE** in the Washington Star says—Statistics are not at hand but it has been stated that not less than one hundred million dollars is invested in horse breeding in the United States, and yet some people say that breeding the light harness horse is not an industry.

**M. R. ARMSTRONG** of Falmouth, N. S., last week disposed of his handsome stallion "Full of Fashion" for a handsome sum. He was imported from Scotland by the Nova Scotian Government a few years ago. At the exhibition in Halifax last year he and his progeny were prize winners.

**FRED WEND-FENTON**, who was warned off the turf some time ago, is bringing an action for libel against the stewards of the Jockey Club. Since writing last, Kirkland has been well supported for the Grand National and last year's winner is now joint favorite with Rannunculus. As to the Lincoln, Dumbarton Castle and Sir Daniel are now most in demand. His Majesty has a dark horse engaged in the Derby. This is Null Secundus, by St. Simon-Nunsuch. If breeding counts for anything the colt ought to go close. Black Arrow and Admirable Crichton, are growing in favor, and will likely be quite as good favorites as Lally.

**A STALLION** to be an ideal sire of a light harness horse must possess a rare combination of valuable qualities; the most important of these qualities is a strong speed return. Extreme speed will always command a higher price than any other single quality. A stallion may possess phenomenal speed ability, however, and still not be a success as a sire of race winners or even of the class of horses that is most profitable for the average breeder to raise owing to a lack of other important qualities. Good inheritance is of the greatest importance; it is the chief requisite of success. Unless a stallion is from a long line of ancestors that were noted for the above qualities he is liable to prove a disappointment in many cases, though as an individual he may be highly endowed with all the requisites to ensure his success as a sire and perpetuator of speed, courage, gameness beauty soundness, etc. When race winning speed is the object sought, great care should be taken to discard all animals that are known to have a cold, slow or cart horse cross within several removes. The stallion whose pedigree contains the name of some of the most famous of the great producing mares like Beautiful Bell, Green Mountain Maid, Miss Russell Alma Mater, and Nancy Hank is more likely to prove successful as a sire, than another which is equally as good as an individual but whose pedigree does not contain the name of any of these most famous great brood mares. The greater the number of such producing mares in a stallion's pedigree and the nearer they are to him the greater is likely to be his success as a sire of uniform speed.

**LAST WEEK** Principal Cummings of the Agricultural Col. Truro, Amos B. Eter of Amherst, and Jas. A. Fraser of New Glasgow were in the United States selecting a suitable stallion of standard trotting breed for the Government of Nova Scotia. Their choice fell on Achille 2:15 1/4 the property of G. W. Leavitt of Readville, Mass., which they have purchased. Achille is one of the very best bred stallions in the State being sired by Bingen 2:06 1/2, that sold at public auction in 1903 for \$32,000.

Last spring they decided to let Achille make a season in the stud, have him worked a little in the mean time and race him in the fall. He was kept so busy with stud duties that for four consecutive weeks and four days he was never once driven upon the track. He performed stud service up to within eight days of his race at Dover, N. H., where he got his record. Mr. Leavitt had unlimited faith in the racing qualities of the handsome son of Bingen and thought that owing to the different character of the Readville and Dover tracks there might never be a better opportunity for testing his disposition and ability to race than was offered there. He instructed trainer Titer to let the others race off ahead of him the first half but be in striking distance at the three quarter pole and beat them in the stretch if possible. The test was made as Mr. Leavitt suggested. Achille raced along pleasantly and contentedly behind most of the others to the half mile pole and when he reached that point there were five horses in front of him, two of which he passed going the next quarter. When called upon he passed the others so easily and won so handily that Mr.

Titer was confident that he could have given the horse a record of 2:10 in that heat had he driven the entire mile with that intention. He was started in four races last fall, won first money in three and second in the other. The Nova Scotia Government is to be congratulated upon securing such a horse as Achille.

**THE HACKNEY HORSE** has a renealogy almost as old as the English Thoroughbred, about the time when the Thoroughbred first began to be bred as a race horse, some of the best blood known on the turf was also disseminated among the common stock of Norfolk and Yorkshire. This stock, known widely as the Norfolk trotter, was famous for its ability on the road, for saddle or in harness, and the blood of the famous Flying Childers, transmitted through his son Blaze, still further improved their good qualities. In the old days the Hackney was famous for its performances in long distance journeys, and it is still to a very large extent, the roadster and driving horse of England. It has for long, however, been bred with more reference to roundness, smoothness of conformation, style, and all round harness style and action than for actual performance, and it is in these particulars that its chief value as a sire for harness horses lies.

The chief features to be guarded against in selecting the Hackney is the tendency to look for too much size and to overlook a lack of quality. Bred to our common run of mares, very often even to small, breedy mares of thoroughbred or trotting blood the tendency seems for the Hackney sire to throw colts which will grow to greater size than himself. The kind of harness horses that are wanted to-day are medium sized, handsome, active and stylish horses, that can "get away." And for producing these the medium sized, breedy, active and energetic Hackney stallion is the horse par excellence. Hillhurst Sensation perhaps one of the most remarkable sires living or dead, is a rather undersized horse.

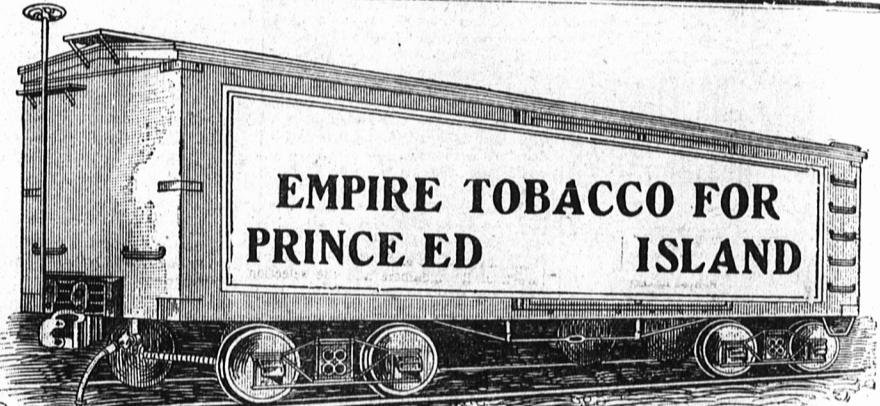

## A RECORDSHIPMENT

This Special Train Has Left St. Thomas With 1,211,351 Lbs. of Canadian Leaf.

A week ago last Saturday a new record was made on the C. P. R. in the largest shipment of tobacco leaf ever made in Canada. A special train of thirty-one (31) cars, all laden with the fragrant leaf, was made up in St. Thomas, Ont., for shipment to Granby, Que. The weight of the tobacco contained in these cars reached the huge total of 1,211,351 lbs., about 31,000 bales, all Canadian leaf, from the counties of Essex and Kent.

Ontario is to be congratulated that the culture of tobacco has grown to such dimensions in that province and the C. P. R. deserve congratulations for their handling of this record shipment.

Mr. W. T. Gregory, the tobacco expert of Leamington, Ont.—the centre of the leaf-growing district—says that the quality is the best ever grown there, and the leaf is in splendid condition.
