### COMMENCING A LIBRARY

To make real friends of books you must possess them, writes George Haw, in The Millgate Monthly. Form your own library. Any lad can buy books nowadays, even though he be in his first year at work, earning no more than 4s a week and allowed no more than threepence a week pocket-money. He need not spend all his pocket-money on books. It might make him piggyish if he did. I suggest half of it. Spend sixpence a month only. Buy a copy each month of Nelson's Sixpenny Classics. You will find these to be well-printed little volumes, bound in cloth and illustrating. Once that interest and that great writers ever issued.

For the first year keep to the standard novels. It is best to begin your reading with fiction. Fiction will awaken your interest in books. Fiction will create in you the habit of reading. Once that interest and that habit are created you will soon desire literature of other kinds. By spending no more than sixpence a month on books you will, in a year's time, have become possessed of twelve masterpieces of fiction. You will find nearly 100 books published in this sixpenny series of Nelson's Classics. Shall I mention twelve of them that you may have as your own at the end of the year—Swift's "Gulliver's Travels," Defoe's "Robinson Crusoe," Oliver Goldsmith's "Vicar of Wakefield," Jane Austen's "Pride and Prejudice," George Eliot's "Adam Bede," Thackeray's "Henry Esmond," Scott's "Ivanhoe," Hans Anderson's Fairy Tales, Charles Kingsley's "Westward Ho!," Charles Reade's "Cloister and the Hearth," Mrs. Craik's "John Halifax, Gentleman," Charles Dickens' "David Copperfield."

### WASPS AS PETS.

The late Lord Avebury used to keep pet wasps, and on one memorable occasion he exhibited a "tame" wasp at one of the sittings of the British Association. This particular wasp was captured from a nest in the Pyrenees, but why his lordship should go so far for a wasp when they are so plentiful at home it is hard to say, and though at first rather too ready with its sting, it became perfectly tame, took sugar from its master's hand, allowed him to stroke it, and always turned to its bottle home.

A certain well-known actress, who is at the present moment delighting full houses with her splendid art, makes pets of huge spiders, and delights in feeding them, attending to their comfort, and generally mothering them and making them as happy as spiders can ever hope to be. It is certain that she is not a member of the company which plays "Kill that Fly." She leaves that role to her pet spiders, and they play it most effectively.

A French comtesse, who is well-known for her beauty and her eccentricities, wore during last season as a neck ornament a beautiful scarabaeus beetle. It was tethered to a ring by a very slender gold chain, which allowed the insect to run about on the lady's shoulder. As that lady wore a large hat, it may be taken for granted that the comtesse had lost—if ever she had it—that feminine horror of anything creepy-crawly.

### REMOVING THINGS FROM THE EYE

Small substances, like cinders, dust, or small chips of stone or metal, can often be removed from the eye by very simple means. Sometimes the flow of tears washes them out. At other times, catching the upper lid with the lashes and pulling it away from the eyeball, and down over the lower lid, then letting go, so that, as it recedes, its under surface is swept by the edge of the lower lid, will clear it out. If this does not prove successful, a loop made of horsehair or of long human hair can be passed under the lid and swept from the other side towards the nose and drawn down.

Better than this, however, is the washing of the eye, or flushing with the eye-dropper. Have the patient catch hold of the lower and upper lids, drawing them away from the eye, and then fill the dropper, which is like a small syringe, with water, and flush the eye two or three times. This will always remove the cinder at once. Should lime get into the eye, it should be treated in the same manner, first with water and then with vinegar or lemon juice and water—a teaspoonful of vinegar or lemon juice to a teaspoonful of water—poured over the eyeball.
