Galehouse Robbed Of No-hit Game Against Washington Senators

NEW YORK, May 15—(AP)—Cleveland Indians won the opening game of a three-game American League series with Red Sox at Boston today, 6-4, but were forced to watch ace Bob Feller in action to quell a dangerous ninth-inning uprising.

At New York, Chicago White Sox humiliated the Yankees with a 13-1 thrashing for New York's fifth consecutive defeat.

At Philadelphia, Harold Newhouse pitched seven hit ball which each of his Detroit Tiger teammates except one hit safely to swam Athletics 10-2.

At Washington, Denny Galehouse, St. Louis righthander, was near the goal of all pitchers—a no hit game—as he blanked Senators 7-0 with one hit.

Jimmy Bloodworth singled after two were out in the seventh inning for the Senator's only hit.

Frank Acorn Wins exhibition Billiards tilt

NEW YORK, May 15—(AP)—Lightweight champion Lew Jenkins becomes a "front man" for welterweight boss Fritzie Zivic tomorrow night when he tangles in a 10-round over-weight tussle with Bob Montgomery, who has been tabbed the "Philadelphia Henry Armstrong."

In other words, if young Bob can knock Jenkins' ears off when they start pitching at 11 p. m. A.D.T. in Madison Square Garden he'll get a shot at the welterweight title, rather than at Jenkins' 135-pound crown. At least promoter Mike Jacobs has promised him that.

Some 14,000 fans are expected to sit in on the fun, contributing to a gross gate of about \$40,000.

The Philadelphia negro, a sharp right-hand puncher with a crowd-pleasing style made to order to bother Jenkins, has been working hard for weeks training for this fight while up to 20 days ago, skinny Lew was putting around the landscape seeing the sights from his motorcycle.

Dartmouth Team retains Candlepin title

DARTMOUTH, N.S., May 15—Spud Beazley's Dartmouth team retained the Maritime-Eastern Maine Candlepin Bowling Championship tonight, defeating Conn-Martels of Halifax in a low-scoring final round match after both crews had gone undefeated through the four-day tournament.

Dartmouth's margin of 26 pins came on a score of 1,453-1,427. It gave the harbor town team a record of 10 straight wins, against nine wins and one loss for Conn-Martels.

Through the low pinfall of the match was a letdown after the high totals both teams had posted through the tournament, it was keenly contested all the way.

Fredrick's entry wound up in third place with a 5-3 average, with Yarmouth in fourth place with 5-4 and Halifax Imperials and New Glasgow tied for the next spot with five wins and five losses apiece.

Glace Bay Aces wound up seventh, having four wins against six losses, and Glace Bay Albions and Sackville tied for eighth with three wins and seven defeats.

The Dartmouth and Halifax teams dominated the tournament throughout and divided the four individual prizes. Conn-Martels took the honors in team total for a single match, 1872 and Don Himmelman's 404 was not only the best of the meet but a Canadian tournament record.

Dartmouth held the single string mark with 597 and Bert Publicover, of the champions, took another prize with 165 for a single string effort Publicover also made 400, first time two men have ever entered this class in a Maritime-Eastern Maine tournament.

Conn-Martels had the high pinfall for the tournament and the veteran Wilbert Martel, in a brilliant comeback, had the high average for the four days' play.

Ship greyhounds Through Canada

MONTREAL, Que., May 16—In order to preserve strains of greyhounds under secure and normal conditions valuable consignments of these animals are being shipped from British kennels through Canada to the Bahamas, this important traffic being entrusted to the express department of the Canadian National Railways which has charge of the movements throughout from start to final destination.

Several groups of greyhounds have already passed through Canada by way of an eastern Canadian port and others are to follow until finally all those selected will be quarantined on the estate of H.R.H. The Duke of Windsor, at Nassau. The various consignments of greyhounds travelling by way of Canada re-consigned to Col. De Rosa, aide to the Duke.

The greyhounds are shipped from a British port to a Canadian port and on arrival in the Dominion are sent to a veterinary to recuperate and prepare for their second sea voyage to the Bahamas. These brought to Montreal have been taken care of at "The Farm," Cote de Liesse Road, where Dr. Charles R. Baker is in charge.

Officials of the Canadian National Express say that the greyhounds stand the voyage very well. They usually are a little leg weary but a week on the farm finds them frisking around. They are kindly animals but require careful handling. They are fed a preparation of meat and biscuit, and milk is a must in the diet of these animals. When in transit the greyhounds occupy a special design of crate.

It is reported that the various shipments of these valuable greyhounds have been carried out without mishap of any kind.
