OPERATION THE RESULT OF BLOW

This popular young lady was on a visit to Prince Edward Island a short time ago, and while there was at a gathering one evening when a roughneck, under the influence of liquor, entered the confines of the company—a somewhat unwelcome guest. A gentleman rushed him out very quickly, but the unwelcome one returning to the scene, became engrossed in an argument with the gentleman who previously had forced him into the street.

In the melee which ensued, the ruffian hit Miss Hughes on the collar bone. Being told of the fact, he denied the same and departed quickly. Consulting an island physician the young lady was informed that she would be all right in the near future.

After her return to St. John, she was bothered with acute pains in the region of the collar bone, and consulting a local physician, he informed her

that the only remedy would be to have the injured bone removed, if she wished to enjoy any degree of comfort, as the effected bone was injured—a result of a hard blow—to which it is believed is in reality the

outcome of the injury received while in Prince Edward Island. She entered the hospital a few days ago, and will undergo the operation this morning. Keep Minard's Liniment in the house

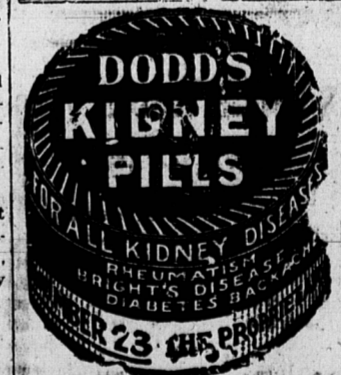

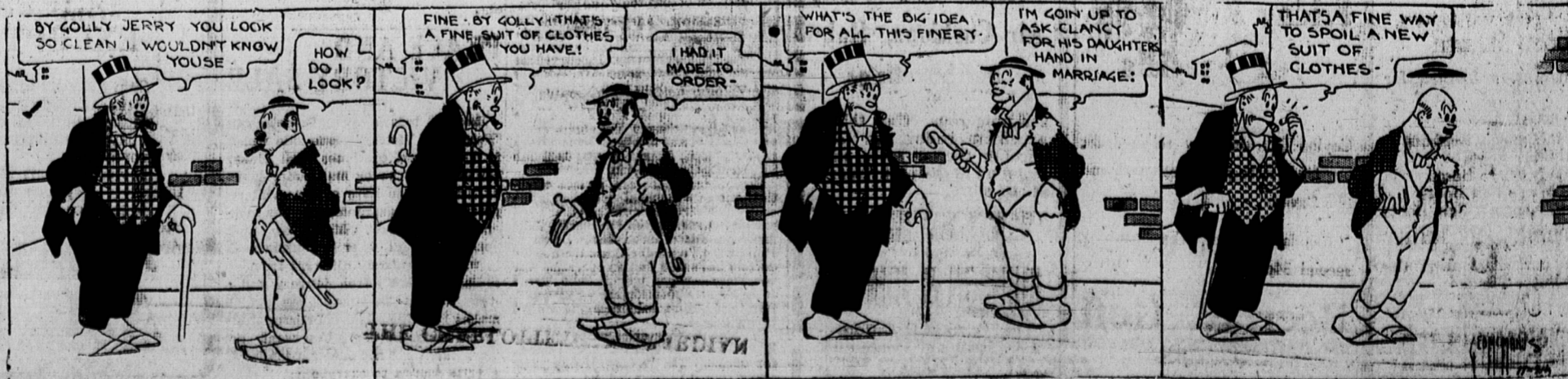
