Potato Subsidy Case Withdrawn

WOODSTOCK, July 31—The case of the Attorney General of Canada against R. F. Smith and M. A. Smith of Hartland, doing business under the name of Smith Bros., has been quashed. It was announced here today. Known locally as the "Potato Subsidy Case," the litigation has been followed with keen interest in Carleton County over a period of several years, the case has been discussed at a transaction in 1943 in which the defendants obtained several thousand dollars in potato subsidies from the Dominion government. Later the Crown alleged that the subsidies had been obtained by fraudulent statements and sued for their recovery.

Original counsel were F. J. Hughes, K. C. of Fredericton and C. J. Jones, K. C. of Woodstock, both of whom have since been elevated to the bench. The hearing was delayed following Judge Hughes' appointment and was not begun until 1946 when it was heard before Mr. Justice C. D. Richards, John, for the plaintiff, and Mr. Jones and C. F. Inches, K. C. of Saint John for the defendants.

Mr. Justice Richards decided in favor of the plaintiff, finding that the defence had fraudulently represented to the plaintiff that he had contracts with local farmers for early delivery of potatoes at \$3.50 per 100 pounds, and for later delivery at \$3 per 100 pounds, when as a matter of fact they did not have such contracts. Judgment was entered for \$114,849.95 and costs.

Appeal was made on the ground that the case was decided on an issue not raised by the pleadings, and that the defendants contending that if they had known the point was at issue the farmers would have been called to prove the contracts. The appeal was argued in February of this year and judgment given for the appellants and a new trial ordered.

Mr. Inches advised his clients today that he had received a notification from Ottawa that the Crown did not intend to proceed further with the case and that a discontinuance had been filed.

Death Toll At Brest Now 20; 417 Injured

BREST, France, July 29—(AP)—Five additional persons died of burn and blast wounds today, bringing the death toll in the Brest harbor explosion to 20. Authorities said 417 persons were injured, 100 seriously, and damage to Brest and its harbor, the most important in Brittany, was estimated at approximately \$1,670,000.

Many of the injured were struck by debris or burned in the fires which followed the explosion of a cargo of ammonium nitrate aboard the 7,176-ton Norwegian freighter Ocean Liberty, Monday.

In Paris legislators prepared a bill—the French National Assembly to appropriate funds for construction. Jules Moch, Minister of Public Works, said the United States and France might confer on new ways of transporting ammonium nitrate, recalling the similarity of this explosion to the one at Texas City, Tex., last April 16 which killed 470 persons and injured 376. (Ammonium nitrate is a synthetic product relatively recently developed. It is made by the introduction of ammonium gas into nitric acid, and now is used principally as a fertilizer.)

Heat Wave From West To Miss Here

(By The Canadian Press) The scorching heat wave which originated in the Central Mississippi Valley last week and moved across the Prairies during the week-end, parching crops throughout Alberta and Saskatchewan, reached Ontario yesterday, as the weatherman predicted that relief was already in sight.

Heat which zoomed thermometers to 100 degrees at many Prairie points is not expected to affect Quebec or the Maritimes, the weather sage told the Canadian Press. Instead, the blanket of warm air will continue due east to smother the New England States, while a cooling breeze from Northern Quebec will move southwards to spare Montrealers the humid 92 predicted for Toronto today.

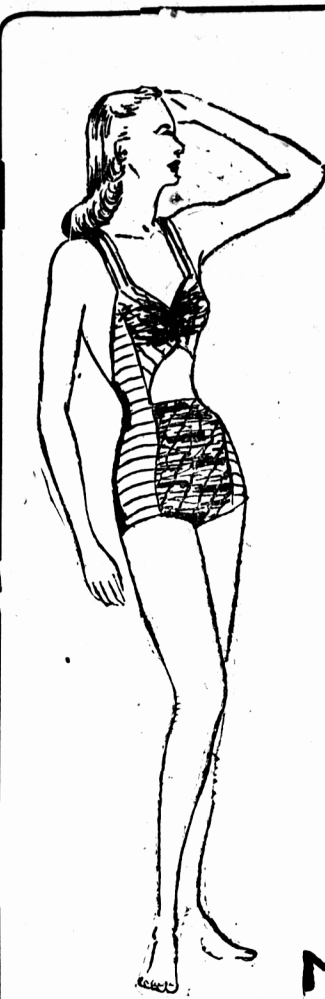
Cooler air moving in from the Pacific Ocean lowered Winnipeg's temperature yesterday afternoon to 84 degrees and promises relief for the country as a whole within two or three days. But don't cheer too soon, adds the prophet: The respite is only relative—a return from the high 90s of the last few days to the middle 80s of normal summer temperature.

The future for co-operatives looks bright and no doubt our business will increase another half million this year. Therefore it is only reasonable that the service, supervision and auditing will increase as the volume of business increases. Six years ago the co-operatives had sales of \$185,000,000, today the sales are well over two million dollars. During the same period the total assets of credit unions increased from \$87,000 to \$800,000,000. This very marked expansion and increase in business necessarily requires an equally marked increase in organizational, supervision and auditing work and yet this work is being carried on with very little additional staff. We have been trying to give the co-operatives and credit unions the service they deserve and we have been giving all the hours that it is possible to get out a day but we know there is so much more that should be done in these three fields. We would like the members to understand our problems in the Co-operative Union office, and that in order to get the work completed satisfactorily, it will be necessary to have more staff.

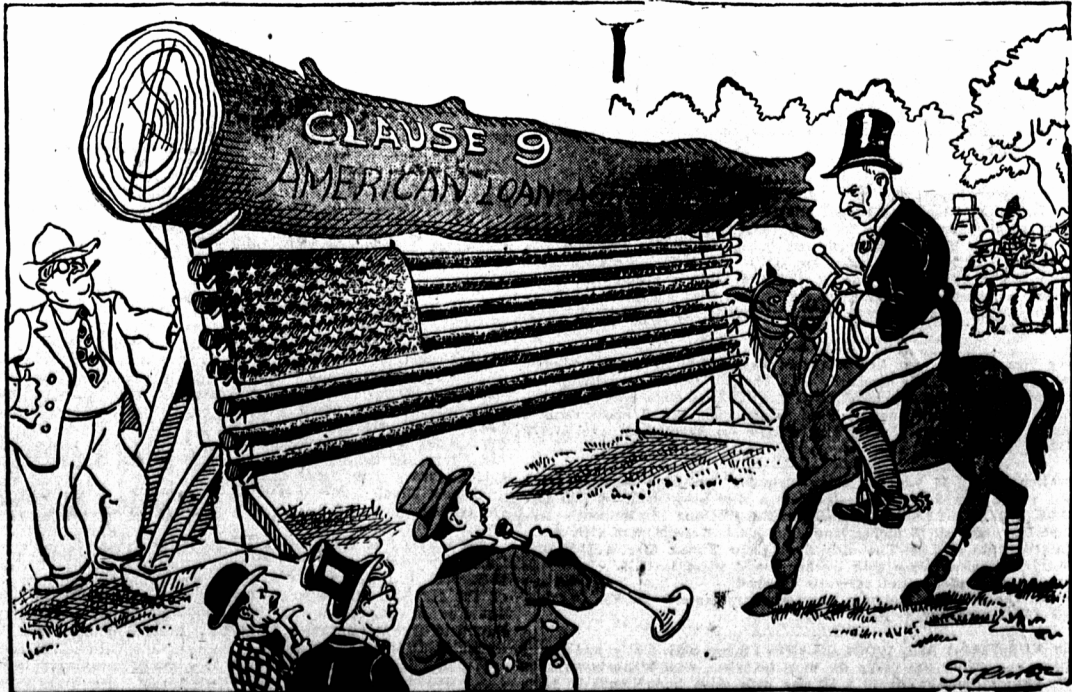
