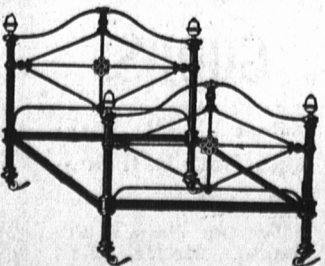

THE LOBSTER SEASON.

We bestow a good deal of attention upon the lobster in one way or another, in this our summer-favored Isle; building neat little houses for him, stored with food to his taste and conveying them to his favorite resorts beneath the waves; then gently lifting him from the water and giving him the fresh air; afterward, (remembering that he has passed a long winter in the icy waters) giving him a nice warm bath at the factory. Yes, we make a good deal of the lobster, in cans and cases, sending him on long voyages to distant climes, cheerfully paying all the charges ourselves. We also make much of him in other ways; in salads and patties; as an honored guest at our feasts; and somewhat also we make of him in hard coin of the realm, when the season is good and the foreign market is propitious. As for the lobster, he is reputed to be more or less unappreciative of all our kindness, but let that pass.

The milk of human kindness, is it not famous in all the sentimental dairies and dairies of the world? And it abounds (to ward the lobster) in yet another way. Our great Parliament wherein we concentrate our wisdom, after gravely considering the case of the lobster in his gravelly bed, has provided for him a close season, which by the way is nothing more nor less than a season in which he may go into undisturbed retirement and change his clothes. For the lobster is not only a very frequent bather, but from time to time makes an entire change of his apparel, and when he has removed his outer garment has been never known to put it on again. And the lobster, especially your well-bred crustacean, is shy of being seen while making his toilet. Which is eminently proper. He gives time, and like the human duke he also gives his whole mind to the task in hand. It is hard work to get out of his close-fitting jacket, and especially the sleeves. A lobster has been known to spend days in getting his right arm out of the sleeve. And to be caught half undressed is a thing no modest and well-bred lobster could tolerate without a shock, especially if the intruder should be voracious and hungry, as many of the denizens of the deep are said to be.

It is written in the books that when the lobster once makes up his mind to enter upon the arduous duties of the clothes season he becomes despondent, and no wonder, so great is the task before him. As somewhat coarsely expressed by Chambers, "for a short time before their moulting they are very languid and inert." Moulting, indeed! It is a coarse word. But disrobing to the lobster, (as to those of human kind, always so considerate to the lobster) is but half the process of dressing. There is the new suit to be provided before any modest and self-respecting lobster can appear out in aquarian society. And there are other things to be considered. The old suit had been not only close-fitting but far too tight for comfort. And the lobster knows that in his new suit as in the old one, there can be no letting out of tucks or seams, no setting over of buttons, and he will never bring himself to project his arms and nether limbs far through his garments as some humans do. Therefore he must grow before the new suit is put on and grow the new suit at the same time. So he hastens to grow, like a cucumber. The ten-inch lobster in his old clothes becomes a twelve inch lobster in his new suit. Who has not known a young man to be

an inch or two taller and more chesky in a bran new suit? Well, the lobster has similar ideas and feelings and they ought to be respected. Hence the importance and propriety of the close season and the clothes season.

Now the mere moralist, who professes to grow his sombre spirit rather than to benefit his kind, would pause right here to draw lessons, and tell us perhaps that the preacher, the teacher, the philosopher and the editor ought also once in a while to cast off the shells in which they have been so long cramped and imprisoned, "build them more stately mansions for their souls" and "leave the out-grown shell by life's unresting sea." What is it but a shellfish motive that prompts one thus or gratify a morbid mood? This article is not written for any such purpose. Our key-note in appreciation for the lobster. 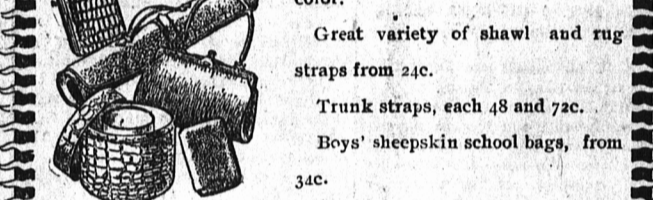
