THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Dec. 6.—Extreme dullness marked the export trade in Canadian grain here today there being practically no demand from foreign buyers. The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was also dull but the tone of the market was steady and prices were unchanged. A fair amount of business was transacted in spring and winter wheat grades of flour and values were firm.
