A CORRECTION.—The statement in yesterday's Guardian, to the effect that the Commission under the local United Church Act is now constituted and functioning was in error. The recognition by the Commissioners for the United Church of the status of the Commission for the continuing Presbyterians is conditional upon the issuing of a new appointment by the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, acting for the continuing Presbyterians of this province in terms of the statute. It is understood that this new appointment will be forthcoming at the earliest possible date. Any action taken in the meantime is provisional only and the proposed third Commissioner has not yet signified his acceptance of office. It is hoped that nothing will prevent the functioning as early as possible of this Commission as by the terms of the statute they are obliged to report to the Provincial legislature at its first sitting which will be early in March.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—Canadian egg markets are generally steady and firm today. Toronto is unchanged. Montreal is unchanged. Winnipeg jobbing fresh extras 42 to 44, firsts 40, seconds 30. Ed. Montreal egg market firm receipts light. Jobbing fresh extras 35, firsts 36, seconds 28. Calgary receipts higher on account of colder weather. Jobbing extras \$11.00 per case, firsts \$9.00 to \$9.50 per case, seconds \$8.00 per case. Vancouver jobbing extras 33, firsts 31, seconds and pullets 26. Halifax, N. S. unchanged. St. John N. B. jobbing fresh extras 47 to 48, firsts 42 to 43, storage firsts 333, seconds 27.
Montreal Que., Feb. 19.—The export trade in grain on the local market was reported very dull and according to the tone of cable advices received by exporters foreign buyers were not disposed to operate at present prices. The local cash grain market was also quiet there being little demand from any source for supplies, but prices for oats were unchanged. The condition of the trade in spring wheat flour was unchanged, business being exceedingly slow but the tone of the market remains as steady and prices unchanged. A feature of the millfeed trade was the increased demand for Manitoba bran with the rise that the undertone to the market was firmer and sales of old straight cars were made at \$31 per ton including bags, extra-track which was an advance of 75 cents per ton over current figures. This was not general as the bulk of the business was done at \$30.25 per ton including bags, extra-track.
The winter feeling developed in the market for standard grades of rolled oats and prices were reduced 10 cents per barrel with a small trade passing at \$3.10 to \$3.20 per bag of 90 lbs. delivered. There were no further developments in the export baled hay trade the demand being somewhat limited and the volume of business small, but prices were unchanged. A weaker feeling developed in the market for fresh seconds and prices scored a decline of 3 cents per dozen owing to the market being over supplied. Sales of this kind of grade were made as low as 32 cents per dozen. On the other hand the tone of the market for the higher grades was steady and prices were unchanged. The undertone to the market for potatoes continues easy and Quebec varieties scored another decline of 5 cents per bag with sales at \$2.75 per bag of 90 lbs. extra-track.
The trade in butter was without any feature prices being steady with a small volume of business done. The market for cheese was featureless, business in all directions being limited and prices were nominally unchanged.

War Risk Insurance

The American Consulate, Charlottetown, has been advised by the Department of State, that it has received a letter dated January 20th, 1926, from the United States Veterans' Bureau, stating that the law provides that unless an ex-service man or woman makes application for reinstatement and conversion of War Risk Insurance before July 2, 1926, the privilege will lapse. In order that all persons entitled to the benefit of this insurance may be informed of their rights, this office has been instructed to invite the attention of all veterans of the World War who served in the American army or navy, resident in this Province, to this fact; and to inform them that complete information and instructions may be obtained upon application to the Washington Regional Office of the
