WORLD'S RECORD FOR 5 MILES

QUEBEC, Sept. 10.—A new world's harness record for a five mile race was established here on Saturday at the closing of the Quebec exhibition harness meeting, when Marloni, a brown gelding, owned by F. Michaud, of Montreal, paced ten rounds of the half mile track in 12 minutes and 23 1/4 seconds. The record standing for five miles up to then was 12.24, established in 1902 by Zombra.

TOTAL ENLISTMENTS IN CANADA TO DATE 431,455

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.—Enlistments in Canada for the last two weeks of August totalled 1,500, which was a decrease of 142, as compared with the preceding two weeks. The recruiting figures by military districts, as given out by the militia department today, are as follows: London, 171; Toronto 591; Ottawa and Kingston, 52; Montreal, 185; Quebec, 36; Maritime Provinces, 119; Manitoba 146; British Columbia, 153; Saskatchewan, 12, and Alberta, 35. Total enlistments in the Canadian expeditionary force are now 431,455.

UNDERWRITERS ADDRESS THE CITY COUNCIL

Sir:—I beg to hand you herewith a copy of a letter which the Board of Underwriters has this day addressed to the Mayor and City Council.

The Board of Underwriters feels that it is its duty to point out to the City the deficiencies in the fire fighting appliances and also point out that the Underwriters prefer to have the defects remedied rather than to be obliged to increase the rates, which is its only other alternative. We trust that all good influences in the city will be used towards the improvements of the different branches of our fire fighting system. Charlottetown, P. E. Island, September 10th, 1917. The Mayor and City Council, Charlottetown.

Sirs:—In view of the recent disastrous conflagration of Saturday morning last, the Underwriters feel there is a serious menace prevailing in the city which they are sure all citizens must realize.

At a meeting of the Fire Underwriters today the matter was thoroughly gone into and it was decided in the interests of the citizens in general that the following suggestions be carried into effect at the earliest possible moment.

EQUIPMENT AND APPLIANCES First.—That the Silby engine be put into first class working order and that a competent engineer be appointed to have charge of this engine; that the couplings of this engine be made to fit all hydrants in the city and that extra couplings be provided in case any should be broken; that the engine shall be taken to all fires as soon as the hose reels and other equipment has been delivered at the fire; and further, that this engine shall be tested at least once a month.

Second.—In view of the fact that there was no extra hose on hand to handle a second or third fire had it occurred on Saturday morning that not less than 1500 feet of new hose, in addition to the 500 feet which we understand is on the way, be provided and that not less than six additional nozzles be provided at once.

Third.—We understand that the City Street Sprinkler has a pump and appliances capable of throwing a stream of water over 100 feet and we would ask that authority be given the Chief that this engine be put into effect in event of an emergency.

Fourth.—We would call your attention to the fact that the fire alarm system which has been agitated for several years past has as yet not been installed and that this is a very serious situation for a city the size of Charlottetown. Insurance rates have been made on the basis that such a system was to be installed and Head Offices of insurance companies are repeatedly calling attention to the lack of same.

Fifth.—It has been demonstrated that there are not sufficient watch men or policemen in the city, at least additional patrolmen should be put on for night duty. Recent fires were well under way before they were discovered. Further, the property saved from a fire is not properly looked after when removed from the buildings and some person should be made responsible for this duty which would result in saving large quantities of property from being carried away.

Sixth.—Several inspectors of insurance companies doing business here have recently visited the Province and have reported to their Head Offices that the electrical wiring in Charlottetown is in very bad shape and they are asking for immediate inspection. We would suggest that the city at once appoint an official capable of doing this work, both for old wiring and new installation.

Seventh.—The danger of shingle roofs has been clearly shown by large conflagrations in this Province and elsewhere and the Board of Underwriters would strongly urge upon your body that a proper by-law which would absolutely prohibit shingle roofs, within the business district at least, be at once passed and enforced.

The above recommendations are made with the concurrence of the full Board of Underwriters and we believe are in accordance with the wishes of property holders in general all over the city.

The Board of Underwriters have no desire to see any further increase in the insurance rates in Charlottetown but there is but one remedy in our hands and unless improvements following very closely and fully along the lines laid down above, are made we know that the same system of rating will be applied here as is being applied in the neighboring Provinces and this will mean a very substantial increase in the rates.

SIX U-BOATS BELIEVED SUNK

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Six hostile submarines are believed to have been destroyed off the coast of France on Sept. 5th, when they attacked a fleet of merchant ships, of which the American steamer Westwego was one. Two of the merchant ships were lost.

A report from Paris to this effect reached the navy dept. today. Following is the navy dept's statement: "The navy dept. has received a report from Paris which states that on Sept. 5th while cruising with several other ships was attacked by a massed force of six submarines off the coast of France on Sept. 5th. The result of this attack being that two of the steamers attacked were sunk and probably all of the submarines were lost."

A REGRETTABLE ERROR (Canadian Press Despatch) WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels announced late today that a telegraphical error in the cablegram describing the encounter between the steamer "Westwego" and hostile submarines had made it appear that six submarines had been sunk and that in fact the report said one of the submarine probably had been destroyed.

WILL GERMANY CAPTURE THE RUSSIAN FLEET. NEW YORK, September 6.—A special cable to the New York World from London says grave fears are expressed there regarding the possible fate of the Russian fleet if its safety depends on the stand being made by the Russian armies.

"Germany has her eyes on the Russian fleet," the cable says, "and its early capture is viewed in London as even a more immediate consequence than the Petrograd campaign. Naval experts hope the fleet will be destroyed by the Russians themselves. In the event that its capture seems imminent."
