CITY COUNCIL

(Continued from page one) plant was outside of the town and the business they were doing in Charlottetown was only a small portion of their operations. It appeared to him as that it was going to be like a black eye for Charlottetown; and he ventured to say that if those things had been put before the Council before the company came here, they would probably have exempted the company from taxation altogether instead of taxing them at this rate.

The matter was in the Council's hands; if they thought it was a good idea to drive business out of Charlottetown in which local men were employed, they had it in their power to do it.

Councillor Riley said that the tax on the Imperial Oil Company was not put on with the idea of driving them out of the town, but with a view to raising revenue. That was the reason why all taxes imposed by the city were imposed. Mr. Peake had presented his side of the question very ably, but there was another side to the matter. The Imperial Oil Company did a large business in Charlottetown. Oil was a commodity that was very generally used in every town like Charlottetown, and the Imperial Oil Company had the privilege of selling their oil out of the city using the streets and having all the advantages he might say, that the ordinary pedlar or person who took goods from door to door had. They kept their stocks of oil outside the city limits so to lessen the danger of fire. Mr. Peake said that that saved a considerable amount to the merchants of the city, but if it saved to the merchants of the city it also saved a good deal of money to the Imperial Oil Company, because they had their oil tanks in an isolated place, and the dangers from fire were lessened; therefore they had not to pay so large an insurance on their stocks of oil.

Before the Imperial Oil Company adopted that system of handling kerosene oil, that class of goods was handled almost entirely by local wholesale merchants who carried considerable stocks of oil in the city, on which they had to pay taxes according to the assessment fixed by the assessors, who visited them every year. But the Imperial Oil Company, by reason of their great wealth, were enabled to carry their stocks outside of the city, and the city was in that way deprived of revenue. Oil was a commodity which paid a tax everywhere, the Imperial Oil Company was a rich concern and he did not think they should complain a great deal about the tax that was levied upon them. Personally he believed that they should pay the special tax imposed. They did not want to place themselves in antagonism to the Imperial Oil Company or to any other business in the city, but it must be recalled that the city Council must collect taxes to carry on the business of the city, and they must collect them in such a way that the burden would fall equally on all classes of the community. He had gone to the trouble of getting some information about the oil business of the city, and he found that the Imperial Oil Company had practically a monopoly of the oil business in Charlottetown.

The Mayor, Mr. Peake, the Council will take the matter into consideration and do the best we can in the interests of the city and in your interests also.

With respect to the petition against the substitution of a concrete sidewalk in West street, Mr. Thomas Coyle, one of the signatories, addressed the Council and pointed out in strong terms that the residents in the district were not prepared to pay for that sidewalk and did not want it. "They are not unreasonable," he said; "they don't want to make water run up a hill and they don't want to improve their property at the expense of another. We have got the majority of the residents of this section against this sidewalk; they were not compelled to sign this petition, but on the other side there was pressure brought to bear on those who signed. The people are not going to mortgage my property to pay for this sidewalk, and that is

the short and the long of it. We don't want the side-walk and we are not prepared to pay for it. Leave the beautifying of the city to the one man whose business it is to do so. Don't let every Tom, Dick and Harry have a load of clay here, and another comes along and lays a load there. We pay a man \$1200 a year to do that work; why should other people interfere with it?"

Mr. E. Cullen also spoke on the matter. He said that the concrete sidewalk was not required; there was a good sidewalk there already and he thought it was unnecessary expense to make the proposed substitution.

With respect to the letter from Messrs. Goff & Co., Mr. Riley explained that the Council were prepared to exempt to the full extent the assessment on the boot and shoe factory, amounting to about \$4,000, and to exempt the warehouse to the extent of \$6,000. He thought that was fair and so did all the other members of the Council, but it appeared from what Mr. Goff told him that he found that the boot and shoe factory was not paying, and he had not got the time to attend to it, and he would rather be out of the business, and in fact intended to close it up. Mr. Goff said it would be less for the Council to exempt him to the extent of \$10,000 as he would not accept of that as being sufficient for him; neither would he assure the Council that he would carry on the business if it were exempted from taxation as he asked for.

On the motion of Mr. Riley, seconded by Mr. McKenna, Mr. James was reappointed a member of the Board of School Trustees for a further term of three years. Also on Mr. Riley's motion, the letter from the Colonial Corporation Company, was referred to the Committee which is at present dealing with the matter, for report to the Council at an early date.

It was moved by Councillor Taylor and seconded by Councillor McKenna that the supply of coal to the City Hall and the Market House be accepted. This was carried.

On motion of Mr. Walker the Council considered the question of laying down a concrete sidewalk in Fitzroy street between Prince and Hillsboro streets. After a good deal of discussion the matter was put to the vote and was carried, only Councillors Riley and Taylor and Councillor James voting against the motion. Councillor Walker said that it was the general custom at the meeting in June to arrange for a Band to play in the square, and he thought that there should be a Committee appointed to arrange for that. On public holidays in the past there had been no public amusement provided for the people, and the men generally went out to horse-racing and whatever amusement they could buy, while the women and children went out if the weather was fine to some square; and he thought that the Council should arrange for a band to play there or some other amusement to entertain those women and children on holiday afternoons, and the Committee might be asked to consider that one of the bands would be willing to play free in that way. Mr. Walker formally moved that a Committee of three be appointed for the purpose stated.

Mr. Riley: It is to be distinctly understood that this Committee is not to make any arrangement without consulting the Council.

The Committee was appointed as follows: Councillors Walker, McKenna, and Campbell.

Councillor Walker spoke of the disgraceful condition of the police station, which he suggested stood in need of whitewashing.

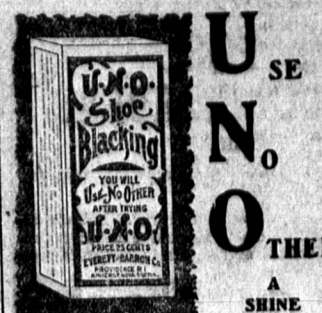
Considerable discussion also ensued over a motion of Councillor McKenna for the installation of an arc-light in Rochford Square. There was an incandescent light there now, he said, which was of no use at all. In the summer when the trees were full of leaf it was not safe for young girls to be in the square after dark, as they were molested and insulted and had to run for refuge.

Councillor Riley was strongly against the motion as he did not think there was a light needed there at all, and he considered that a light in the square at present was quite enough, especially at this time of the year. He did not care if they

put the electric plant down in the square it would not keep some of the wild females from hanging round there at night.

The motion found strong support from the Mayor, who said that he had been asked by the people resident around the square to do all he could to forward the movement for the installation of an arc-light there. At times there was no moonlight, all kinds of characters congregated there and was a source of annoyance to the respectable people living in that locality. He walked up and down there every day and saw the necessity of having an arc light there, an incandescent light was useless. He knew that they had little money to spend, but he thought that they should economize in other ways and give the people the light for which they had been asking for a long time and which was very badly needed. Those people had a right to be protected in every way.

The motion was put to the vote and was carried; only Councillors McKenna, McKenna and Riley voting against.

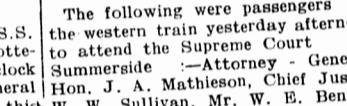
