putting a bungalow on that plot, was it then?

A. Yes, we threshed the question out and I said that I would like a bungalow built with at least five rooms. We asked him what this would cost and he said 200 pounds would see it comfortably through.

Q. Did you close the bargain?

A. Yes.

Q. What was the bargain?

A. We bought 10 1/2 acres at 50 pounds, Capt. Duthie and myself. Q. Neither of you are married?

A. No.

Q. And you proposed to live together and work together on this land jointly?

A. Yes.

MR. INMAN: Is there a bungalow on that land?

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL: We will come to that in due time. What about the bungalow that was to be built?

A. It was to be built for 200 pounds over and above that?

Q. What was the total amount that you agreed to pay?

A. We agreed to pay 525 pounds for the land and 200 pounds for the bungalow, making a total of 725 pounds.

Q. Did you get anything in writing?

A. Yes, he gave us a receipt for the money.

Q. How much did you pay him?

A. I paid him half the amount, 362 pounds 10 shillings, and Capt. Duthie paid half.

Q. Was there anything else in writing except the cheques that you gave him,—an acknowledgment in writing, signed, of the purchase?

A. No, except that when I sent my cheque I wrote saying that was buying the land and the bungalow together with Capt. Duthie.

Q. Did you keep a copy of that?

A. Yes, but I sent the copy of my letter to Capt. Duthie. It reads as follows: Edgemoor, S. Devon, 13th June, 1923.

Dear Mr. Mitchell: I enclose cheque, value 362 pounds 10 shillings in settlement of my half share with Captain Duthie in a 10 1/2 acre ranch and 200 pounds bungalow in connection with your settlement scheme at Prince Edward Island. I should be glad to receive an acknowledgment of same. I take it that an early start will be made of the construction of the bungalow, so that it may near completion by the time Capt. Duthie and myself arrive out there. I will let you know as soon as I hear on what boat my passage has been booked by the Indian office. I wish to thank you for your kind hospitality shown to me last Monday night and hope that you will dine with me on my return from Devonshire at the beginning of next month.

I remain, Yours faithfully, A. H. BULTER, Capt.

Q. Did you get a reply to that?

A. Yes.

Q. Have you it with you?

A. No.

Q. Did you get a receipt?

A. Yes, but I left my papers at home in the Old Country.

Q. You paid yours in one payment?

A. Yes.

A. We drew up a deed of partnership between us and it was Mr. Mitchell that got the deed together and we signed it in his presence.

Q. Was it prepared by a solicitor?

A. It was prepared by Mr. Mitchell. I don't know whether he got the opinion of a solicitor or not.

Q. When did you leave the Old Country?

A. On the 25th of August. I paid my money on June 13th and he promised to have the bungalow ready by the time we got out, in reply to my inquiries. And when we got out there was no bungalow.

Q. Did he make any arrangement for taking care of you on this side?

A. Yes, he told Capt. Duthie to meet us at Halifax and he was to show us around and introduce us to the necessary people who would help us along. Capt. Duthie met us at Halifax and took us along. We came to the island and had a look at the land.

Q. Did you know Capt. Duthie previously?

A. No.

Q. He met you at Halifax and brought you over here?

Q. Did you go through from Borden to Emerald?

A. No, we went from Borden to Charlottetown and stayed the night at Charlottetown and went out by car to Emerald. He showed us the land and it was not the block that we supposed it was not number 55. The reason he gave was that there were no roads built on the plot we had chosen.

Q. London were told that everything was completed, that every block was practically settled, that all those plots had been taken up, and that on the other block there quarters of the plots had been taken, and that we were only left in time to get our plot of land in block 2. When we arrived we said we were the first people out here and we did not get the plot that we had chosen in London. We got another plot which we did not like, and we would not have anything to do with the proposition.

Q. There was no bungalow?

A. No, except that some scantling had been dumped out on the ground which we understood had been done since we came to the island. But if we had not arrived probably it would not be there at all.

Q. You were not satisfied with your property?

A. No, and from inquiries we made about the land we think that we paid a very big price, too big a price.

Q. Now that you are out here, are you satisfied that you can make a living on ten acres out there?

A. I should not like to try it.

Q. You were not long in finding out that you could not sell vegetables in Emerald?

A. No, not long.

Q. Have you taken any steps to get in touch with Mitchell since coming out?

A. Yes, we wired him saying that we were dissatisfied with the scheme and wanted a refund of money we paid in London. He wrote back saying that he was sending Lieut. Jackson out here who would go into the matter.

MR. INMAN: Have you that letter?

A. Yes, it reads as follows:—Yeoman House, 31-32 Haymarket, London, S. W. 1. 27th Sept., 1923.

Capt. A. H. Butler, Care of The Royal Bank of Canada, Charlottetown, P. E. I., Canada.

Dear Captain Butler: I received your telegram that you desired the refund guaranteed. I have already mailed a letter with regard to this to you and Captain Duthie about a week ago. I thought that it was only a very fair thing for me to do. We have a lot of people coming out this year, they will amount to about 50 all told, and there is no doubt whatever that the Colony will be filled up by next year. I am sorry that a lot of settlers have not gone out prior to the arrival of you and Captain Duthie, but these things have to be commended, as you will appreciate, and I will therefore send this guarantee on the condition mentioned in my letter, because you are pioneers of the Colony Area. I am sending Lieut. Jackson, R. N., out there. He will arrive in about three weeks and will assist you in the work. He will go into the above thoroughly with you. Hoping you and Capt. Duthie are well with kindest regards and best wishes.
