Butter twenty five and twenty six cents per pound, eggs twenty eight cents per dozen, ducks seventy-five to one dollar a pair, chickens fifty to seventy five cents per pair, geese eighty to one dollar each, loose straw thirty cents per cwt, loose hay forty five to fifty cents per cwt; pressed hay eight fifty to nine dollars per ton, pressed straw five to six dollars, potatoes twenty cents per bushel, turnips eleven to twelve cents, white cots thirty eight cents, black forty to forty one cents and pork seven to seven and a half cents.
