Nazis Use Brandy For Gasoline Pep

LONDON, Nov. 30—(C P)—Seeking desperately for all possible resources, the Germans are using 60-year-old brandy in the cognac line for their bombers, a Frenchman said on arrival here from his home city of Bordeaux.

Since the beginning of July, even in Bordeaux, where once people lived on the fat of the land, food is becoming scarce, he said. Women of every class and degree of wealth line up in long queues each morning to be doled out what the Germans have not requisitioned.

"My countrymen are finding ways and means of slowing up production, of stopping supplies to the Germans," he added. "I know of many wagons loaded up in the south destined for occupied France which reach their destination empty."

The refugee said no part of France is uncaptured. There are German agents in civilian dress in every town and hamlet. "In the cafes, trains or trams you feel their ears and eyes everywhere."

Interpreting the War News

The cold gloom of Europe's second winter is closing in amid multiplying signs that it may see a supreme and perhaps decisive test.

Impponderable factors preclude even a guess as to when, where or how the war will end. Among the horsemen of horror loosed on Europe by the war to make this probably the most tragic Christmas season the old world has ever known are starvation and freezing cold for tens of millions of non-combatants. There are discernible, however, certain symptomatic items indicating that there may be graver concern over the winter outlook in axis Europe than in London. They give the lie to the Nazi-Fascist assumption that mankind in the mass can be dragged by force alone into a new way of life.

Intimations of tottering national morale point now toward Italy. No other reasonable explanation of the Italian army's fiasco in Greece has been offered. It may have stemmed from Italian public distaste extending into the ranks of Mussolini's best troops, for the war and the army's pathos.

Blundering by Italian strategists and army staffs alone cannot account for Greece's route of her attackers against great odds of numbers and modern battle gear. The Italian army in Albania was hand-picked and carefully prepared for its invasion job. It was composed of forces recruited from northern Italy, from the Italian Alps. These Italian units proved themselves fighting men yet in this war they failed at the first test against a foe utterly inferior in numbers and equipment.

Now is revealed by Washington government reports on Italy's economic plight that the British blockade has been grinding for months at Italian morale. Sharply rationed food and skyrocketing prices are noted. That all Italy has thus far gleaned from Mussolini's great adventures at war in Ethiopia, in Spain and Greece.

By contrast, in bomb-tortured Britain there is no hint of declining morale. Bright visions of Italy are reflected in London war news. The essential pillars of the Hitler-conceived "new order" structure for continental Europe are lacking still. Spain in the west and Bulgaria in the east are still standing aloof.

An upsurge of French public reaction has thwarted the Hitler-Leval hopes for an effective political union between Berlin and Vichy. Intimations of popular free French demonstrations in both German-occupied and unoccupied France leak through newspapers.

Nazi-conquered Norway, Holland and Belgium the same story is told day by day.

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Fought Years To Clear Name

LONDON, Nov. 24—(C P)—Perseverant but unsuccessful battles against the War Office led to have his name cleared after a 34-year-old incident, Major William Augustus Aram has died. He was 75.

The tangled case began in 1906 when he and several other officers of the 5th Royal Irish Lancers were asked to resign their commissions. Although he was removed from the strength of the regiment, he was appointed a staff officer at the war office and held the position until 1910.

Major Aram contended the War Office took their action because of his alleged involvement in a letter. He had been reported to the War Office that he owed money to a woman and that was the reason for their action. He said he had a legal state-ment from the woman denying it.

He entered parliament as member for Woolwich in January, 1910, but was defeated at the election in December. He had no more to say about the matter until the officers meeting to resign and contended that fact and the revival of rumors concerning him caused him to lose his seat.

The story had a court angle when he brought a libel action against the late Sir Edward Ward, permanent secretary of the War Office, for publishing a letter about him and his wife in a trial the jury awarded Major Aram 2,000 pounds (in those days \$9,720) damages. Appeal judges decided the accusation was privileged and he lost his 2,000 pounds. Court Appeal.

Since 1910, Major Aram had brought his case to the notice of successive prime ministers and war ministers and it was raised in both houses of parliament but it never succeeded in having it rectified.

He said one: "I was engaged to I had to break off the engagement when I became aware that she was an imbecile. Soon afterwards a rumor went round I owed her money and the rumor persisted, although I had a legal statement from her denying it."

New Canada Speaks

Reports that Germany is organizing a "new union" in German-occupied Poland arouse comment in both Polish and Ukrainian papers published in Canada. "Czas" (Polish Times), Winnipeg, prints messages from London.

Cracow telling of the organization of Ukrainian units in both Poland and Czechoslovakia. "The Germans," says the London message, want to create hostility between the Poles and the Ukrainians and for this reason they are granting the Ukrainians so much freedom. On the other hand, they think that the organized Ukrainian battalions will be of use against Russia.

The Zurich message cites reports that the German Government has brought tens of thousands of young Ukrainians into Czechoslovakia for the purpose of giving them military training. "The message adds, 'Intend to organize a Ukrainian army in order to recuperate the Ukraine.'"

"Ukrainsky Holos" (Ukrainian Voice) warns against the organization of Ukrainian Nationalists. "The main thing," says Ukrainian Voice "is that under the name of the Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists a small group of Ukrainian emigrants is hiding, who has the political plans with those of Germany and is serving Germany... A Ukrainian who is a Canadian citizen should understand that, as his and his children's life is at stake in Canada, he would cut the very branch on which he is sitting if he turns against Canada. This does not mean that he cannot do anything to help Ukrainian people overseas. He can and he should do it but he should always take into consideration whether or not his actions can be reconciled with his status as a Canadian citizen... He who interprets Canadian freedom as a license to cause disunity in the Canadian home, who utilizes Canadian democracy in order to overthrow the very same democracy in Canada and to impose a Russian or German yoke upon the Ukrainian people in Europe, then it is no enough to persuade such an evil-doer with calm words, to argue or to quarrel with him. It is imperative to warn the public of
