IN MEMORIAM

JOHN CALVIN MACQUARRIE

News of the death of John Calvin MacQuarrie, formerly of Charlottetown, will be learned with regret by relatives and friends in Prince Edward Island and elsewhere.

Mr. MacQuarrie was born in Crapaud, his parents being the late Mr. and Mrs. Allan MacQuarrie and in his youth moved to Charlottetown, where he was held in high esteem. About thirty-five years ago he went to the United States where he became engaged in hospital work.

During the years he spent in the United States, he made frequent visits to his old home where he was heartily welcomed by his many friends. In 1922 he came home on account of his father's illness, and after his death, went to live with his widowed sister, Marion, in West Harpsville, Maine, where he was tenderly cared for through his trying illness which extended over a year and a half until his death on November 3, 1936.

During his illness he regretted that he could not once more visit the scenes of his early life, and see among the ones who were near and dear to him.

Of his immediate family there are left to mourn his passing three brothers and three sisters, namely: James, in Charlottetown; Edwin, in Soneham, Mass.; Artemas, in Mattapan, Mass.; Mrs. Hannah MacLennan, in Truro, N. S.; Mrs. Marian B. Littlefield, in West Harpsville, Maine; and Mrs. Isabel Mahan, in Middletown, Conn., besides several nieces and nephews.

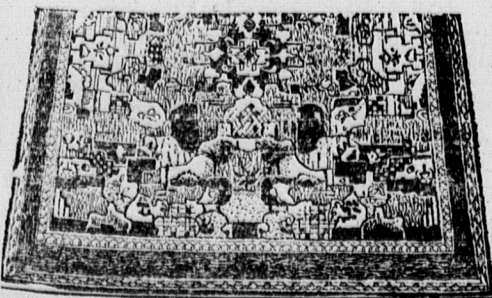
