Scorching Pace Tourist's Bane In Modern Rome

ROME, Feb. 13—(CP)—War never was as dangerous as today's battle to stay alive in Rome. The question of earning one's living aside, it's the physical hazard that keeps the visitor on the "qui vive"—especially if he deviates from the dictum: "When in Rome . . ."
No wartime ride at the hands of the most incautious army drivers can compare with one today behind a Rome taxi driver. One foot on the accelerator and a hand constantly on the horn, his mission seems to be to whirl his passenger along the straight-est line from "A" to "B" without deviation for pedestrian traffic. Pedestrians develop a sixth sense, after even the shortest time in the capital, for imminent traffic peril, and Holy Year pilgrims lost in silent meditation have learned to jump with the best.
Though Rome has added spacious trolley-buses to her street-car transport system, the struggle to enter and then to get out is waged as furiously as ever. Passengers still bulge at the doors. One week in Rome saw this reporter's coat lose three buttons in the civil war within street-cars and two pairs of shoes ruined by scuffing.
For all its historic culture and courtesy are at a premium in Italy.
Luxuries For Wealthy
Rome's store windows glisten with luxury articles, priced beyond the reach of the masses, who shop mainly in the open-air markets. There they may "contract" for everything from potatoes to bed sheets. To "contract" in Italy means to bargain, and it's an inexperienced hand who pays the dealer his opening price. Private enterprise is building large blocks of luxury apartments in Rome's exclusive areas, but the slums remain largely as they were. Nonetheless, 300 new bars were licensed in 1949 and the city's thousands of cafes and bars glisten in chrome. Night life abounds.
"Stesta" has moved back into observance. Government offices don't open until 10 a.m. and close at noon for lunch. No one returns before 4:30 to stay until an indefinite hour has worn eight and nine. Stores close from 12 until 3:30 p.m. and stay open then until seven.
The first customer entering a Rome shop in the morning gets his purchase free. Even if he doesn't buy anything he has to carry something away "for luck" both for the proprietor and himself. Efforts to be first into a liquor shop selling a popular Canadian rye whiskey at 3.50 lire (\$6.20) a bottle failed on three successive mornings.
Tattered and much patched, Allied Military Government lire notes still circulate—referred to ironically by the citizenry as "occupation money." Hardly better are the Italian notes, which are at 1710 to the pound call for stationary clips to hold them together.
Intriguingly slow by North American standards are Italian telephones, especially on long-distance calls. Given a call to a point 150 miles distant on a trunk line and asked "will it take long" the operator replies: "No, only an hour or so."
Three attempts up afternoon to raise Ortona by phone from Rome—another 150 mile circuit—produced late that evening the information that "the Ortona switchboard closed at 8 p.m."
