REV DR TROTTER OPERATED UPON

Toronto, March 27.—A serious operation was performed upon Rev. Dr. Thomas Trotter, in the General Hospital today. Dr. Trotter was formerly Professor in McMaster University, and then went to accept the Presidency of Acadia College, Wolfville, N.S. More recently he had been chosen pastor of the Ashland Avenue Church, in Toledo, Ohio. For some time he has been suffering from hip and thigh disease. The hospital authorities report that Dr. Trotter is doing well...

FURTHER NEWS OF FRESH REVOLT

Puerto Cortez, Honduras, March 21.—News of the sacking of San Marcos, Honduras, under pitiful circumstances on account of a fresh revolt in the interior of Honduras, and information of considerable financial loss to American interests because of the war, have been received here. The sacking of San Marcos was related by General Gardamo of the Honduran army, whom Nicaraguan dispatches said had been killed at San Marcos on Feb. 29. General Gardamo of the Honduran army, was wounded for several days after his defeat at San Marcos, and finally gained the Honduran lines uninjured. He then gave an account of the outrages perpetrated on the women and defenceless citizens of the captured town, which, he said was looted and sacked by the soldiers of Nicaragua. Details of his story have not reached here...

A STRANGE DEATH IN SASKATCHEWAN

Prince Albert, Sask., March 23.—Harry Jones aged 23, died Thursday night at McDowell from the effects of a bullet wound inflicted under peculiar circumstances. The deceased was with an estimable young woman when he was shot. He was in love with the girl, but it is said that the affection was not reciprocated. The Royal Northwest Mounted Police here were notified and Inspector Pennefather held an inquest relative to deceased young man at the time before he died. He had said that the shooting was entirely accidental and the girl was not to blame. Under the circumstances a verdict of accidental death was returned. Mr. Jones was well known here where he was well connected...

AUSTRIAN OFFICER GIVES HIS VIEWS

Berlin, March 23.—Captain Ignaz Rodic of the general staff of the Austrian-Hungarian army, is a pamphlet entitled "The Prospects of the Future American-Japanese War" declared that the unprotected Pacific coast of the United States offers excellent chances of the success of the Japanese. He asserts that Japan is working feverishly to complete her military and naval equipments at a time during the last few months 20,000 men have been at work day and night in the arsenals, turning out guns and small arms, and stating that the cartridge manufactories at Tokio and Nagoya, where 20,000 men are employed, have turned out daily 5000 rifles, while the projectile works at Tokio make 600 shells per day for the field artillery...
