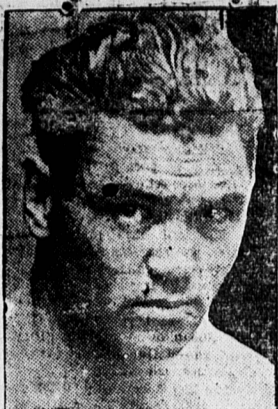

Gross weighed 194 1-2; Rojas 194. Matt Adgie, 172 pounds, was awarded the referee's decision over Levinsky, 188 1-4, after the judges had disagreed at the end of their 10-round bout. Both are Philadelphians.

That was his fatal move; Dempsey caught him with a wicked left flush on the jaw and he went down and out for the count. It happened in the seventh round.

With the exception of the first round Dempsey was the aggressor. Even in the pugilistic world apparently to be on the receiving end and much battered, he kept continually boring in for Sharkey's body. It looked as though Sharkey was in a bad way in the sixth and on the verge of a knockout.
