It means considerable to a Silver Fox fur to have it well taken off, nicely shaped and properly fleshed and dried.
I have noted with much interest the work of skinning and preparing for market of Mr. Peter Wishe. His method of pelting and shaping the skins should appeal strongly to the fur farmer, as well as to the fur merchant, and I would strongly recommend his services to those that have a good class of pelts to be taken off. A few dollars expended on a good pelt by a careful man for skinning and dressing may add quite a number of dollars to the value of the pelt.
