The death occurred recently of Rev. Mr. Ancient, diocesan secretary of Nova Scotia. He was with the fleet in the Crimean War. Rev. Mr. Ancient was stationed at Terrence Bay at the time of the wreck of the White Star steamship Atlantic, April 1, 1873, and was the means of saving a number of lives. He went to Halifax shortly afterwards, and became rector of Trinity Church. Subsequently he was appointed to the office he had at the time of his death. Rev. Mr. Ancient was a native of Lincolnshire, England, and served in the Navy for many years. He leaves a widow and three daughters, one the wife of Rev. W. B. Sisam, and two at home. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon, from St. Luke's. His daughter Mrs. Sisam is well known in this Province.

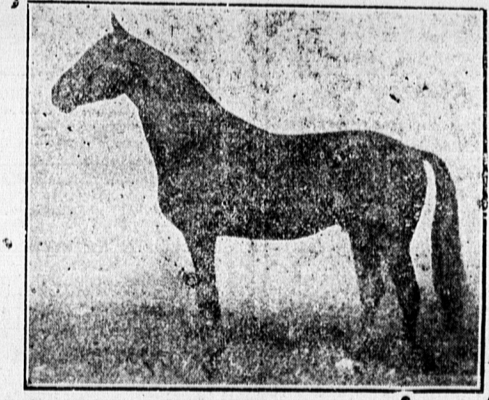
