J. H. Bell, Esq., M. P. left yesterday on return to Ottawa.

The many friends of Rev. W. H. Smith were glad to see him down town yesterday after having been confined to his house for a week with a severe attack of grippe. He will occupy his pulpit tomorrow morning and evening.

Prince Edward Lodge, I. O. O. F., is evidently booming, judging by the work done at its last regular meeting when the second degree was conferred on nine candidates. The meeting was an unusually large one, there being forty present.

Rev. Chas. McKay, former pastor of Kensington and Long River, while in town yesterday, showed to a number of friends some justly prized souvenirs from his late congregation. One, a handsome and valuable gold watch, suitably engraved, accompanied with an address and a well filled purse had been presented to him at a social held last Thursday evening at the home of Mr. D. McKenzie, French River. The other, a beautiful Forester's Pin presented also with an address at the same time and place by his brethren of Deaujour Court, Clifton. The social was an exceedingly pleasant affair, there being about 140 friends and former parishioners present.

Messrs. William and Fred, Clark, sons of Mr. Charles Clark of Clark's Mills who with a hired man were hauling mussel mud from the Bedeque beds, had a little experience with the ice yesterday morning. When about to cross the channel above Wilnot Bridge, having some doubt as to the strength of the ice, they took the precaution to unharness their horses. They then hauled the first load across by hand and while attempting to follow with the other the sleigh broke through and went to the bottom, followed part of the way down by Mr. Fred, who was fortunately caught by his brother in time to save him from going to the bottom, and possibly from drowning. The sleigh with its load has not yet been recovered.

The Quarterly convention of the Church of England in P. E. I. opened in St. Mary's Church Summerside on Tuesday 20th inst. by a service in the evening at 7.30. In the Chancel were Rev. J. Godfrey who said prayers, Ven. the Archdeacon of P. E. I. Rev. Leo Williams and the Rector of Summerside. An able sermon was preached by Rev. L. Williams from Ps. 65.2. "O thou that hearest prayer, unto Thee shall all flesh come." The congregation was large considering the condition of the roads and the service bright and hearty.

On Wednesday morning the delegates attended an early celebration of the Lord's Supper, and at 10 o'clock assembled in the Guild Room where they assembled for business. After routine business Mr. James Millman of New London parish read an excellently conceived paper on the subject of self-help and the general prospects of the Convention's work. A lively discussion arose participated in by all members present over the question of the census, and the project of placing two divinity students at the disposal of the Archdeacon during the summer months for the purpose of aggressive work in several neglected fields. The Archdeacon being called away by a pressing parochial engagement and the Vice President being absent, owing to illness, (great regret having been expressed at his enforced absence) Rev. J. M. Withycombe was asked to fill the chair for the remaining sessions.

In the afternoon Rev. J. M. Withycombe introduced the discussion on Sunday school by a suggestive and exhaustive paper. He was followed by Miss Green who read a very excellent paper on the Teacher's Duty and how to perform it. A bright and edifying discussion followed, lasting till the time for adjournment. In the evening a public meeting was held, an address of welcome was delivered in a happy manner by D. Rogers, Esq., Mr. Aylwin of Kensington followed with an interesting address on N. W. missions with which the audience was well pleased. Percy Pope Esq. read a characteristically thoughtful paper as the subject of Parochial Finance which was followed by a stirring speech by the Rector of St. Paul's. Many of the delegates left for their homes after the meeting while Messrs. Cottin, Haszard, Pope and Williams remained till the noonday train on Thursday.
