Head Offices In New Prowse Block—Charlottetown.

Rev. A. W. Nicholl, Kensington was in the City yesterday.

The Norwegian steamer *Por* with a cargo of coal, came into port yesterday.

Rev. H. W. Toombs will preach at Clyde River at 11 a. m.; Brookfield at 3 p. m. and Hunter River at 7 p. m.

Golfers are enjoying the game at Belvedere links these days. The Club will have its first tea day on Victoria Day the 25th inst.

The work of laying the new sidewalks in the City in accordance with the program introduced by Chairman Prowse at the last City Council meeting, will be commented next week.

Divine services, by the Rev. John Gillis will be held on next Sabbath, May 19th in the Presbyterian churches of Stanley Bridge 11 o'clock, Cavendish 3 o'clock and New Glasgow at 7 o'clock.

The train from Summerside bringing down the passengers brought over from P. DuChene yesterday by the S. S. Empress, arrived in the City last evening. Among the passengers were Edward and Mrs. Bayfield and Miss Bayfield, who have returned home from British Columbia.

A search warrant for the premises of the Halifax Breweries Co., Lower Queen Street. They found two coppers in which were stored beer, etc. One of the coppers had to be entered by breaking the lock. The police brought away with them twelve bottles of beer, taken from the stock found, to be analysed.

In order to investigate the cause of the delay in forwarding freight from Pictou to this port by the Government winter steamers, President Tidmarsh and Secretary Miller of the Charlottetown Board of Trade went over to Pictou to make enquiries. They returned yesterday. They interviewed M.C. Webster, the I.C.T. agent and Dodd Dwyer the agent of the Department of Marine and Fisheries Pictou. Both these gentlemen courteously furnished all information and stated that there was no particular reason for the Government boats not taking any freight that was offered. There had been no attempt from any quarter to influence them in holding back freight for any particular boat. They were left perfectly free to act in the matter subject to course, to the direction of the consignees. In the past, the freight charges on the Government boats, on certain classes of goods, have been higher than those on the Steam Navigation Company's boats. The rates on the Government boats are still higher in some instances. For these reasons, in the past, consignees have forwarded by the summer boats, hence across the principal reason for holding freight for the summer boats as soon as they started to run, but the Government had given no instructions whatever in the matter. This season conditions were exceptionally peculiar, as the presence of ice so late in the season interfered greatly with the regularity of trips by the summer boats, hence the congestion of freight. There are at present about fifty cars of freight at Pictou for the Island, which under present conditions, will keep all three steamers busy for some time to come. Messrs Tidmarsh and Miller were assured that the freight would be rushed forward in all possible despatch.

In the report of the Prohibition cases tried in Georgetown on Monday, only very brief mention was made of their disposal. The facts connected with the case of John Knight, druggist, Souris are of sufficient general interest to be recounted more fully. In this suit a sale of liquor was proved and the defendant justified under two doctors' certificates. His counsel for the prosecution, A. J. B. Mellish agreeing to admit same if regular. Mr. Mellish examining it, however, refused to allow it to go in without proof as he alleged a page had been torn out and fresh entries made to cover the dates, March 13th and 15th. He characterized it as an effort to mislead the Court by bogus and fraudulent entries. Mr. Stewart for the defendant asked for an adjournment till the afternoon to produce the defendant. This was granted, but on the Court meeting he closed the case without sitting the defendant on the stand, or making any other effort to put the case in evidence. Mr. Mellish argued for the plaintiff that the Prohibition Act, previous to April 5th, forbade any one to sell liquor except vendors and druggists. He claimed that druggists could only sell under the conditions presented in the status, namely they must have (1) a Doctor's certificate; (2) They cannot sell more than 12 oz at a time; and (3) they must make an entry in a book kept for this purpose. These matters must be shown by way of defence, and the latter condition had been shown to be fulfilled in the case—therefore the defendant could not claim exemption but was guilty. Mr. Stewart in reply claimed that the entry in the book was a condition subsequent that did not affect the validity of the sale. Stipendiary Inman reserved judgment.

James Murley returned to the city yesterday from Cape Bear, where he spent the past three months.

The brig, *Aquila*, and the schooners *Brilliant*, *Acacia* and *Nereid* cleared yesterday with cargoes of produce.

The schooner *John Millard* is loading 110 tons of coal at the pier, Sydney, for Prince Edward Island.

Among the passengers to the city yesterday by the *Campana* were Mr. and Mrs. Deacon, Montreal, who intend to reside in Charlottetown.

Percy Stewart of the Anglo American Telegraph Co., who spent the winter at Cape Bear, left yesterday morning on return to his home in Sackville, N. B.

The Northumberland arrived in port at 12.45 p. m. yesterday having left Pictou at daybreak. She brought a number of passengers and fifteen cars of freight.

There is much floating ice yet reported in the Straits, but yesterday some schooners managed to get into port and the wharves have resumed the lively look which usually marks them in the spring.

Quahang fishermen moved out into the river yesterday to gather in the shellfish, for which there is at present a brisk demand. Not many so far have come to the City, but in the next few days this industry should be in full swing.

At the Park these evenings sportive signs of summer are evidenced by the footballers and baseballers who every evening have energetic practices. Last evening there was a rousing football rally by the boys of the city clubs. The "soccer" game has a number of adherents this year who will perhaps bring on a game of association football ere long.

The regular monthly meeting of the Glenwood Free Temperance Society was held in the hall there on the 3rd inst. Rev. D. MacLellan, President, occupied the chair, and opened the meeting with singing, scripture reading and prayer, rendered by Lettie McDonald; speech, Michael McDonald; recitation, Hilda Bets; speech, Andrew Livingstone; recitation, Begha Bouter; speech, A. W. Boyle; organist, Lettie McDonald. The meeting was the ninth anniversary of the Society, which is still in a flourishing condition and doing a good work.

The S. S. *Campana* arrived yesterday from Quebec, by way of Summerside where she has been kept for a day or two by obstructing ice. She brings a large cargo of general merchandise to this port, and will remain until repairs are made to her propeller which has been broken by the hard knocks received in steaming through the ice she met with in the gulf. The steamer will probably be beached while the repairs are made. It is not expected that much time will be lost at the operation. She will take from here on return to Montreal 150 cases lobster, 20 cases chickens, 800 cases eggs, 120 bags potatoes and sundry other freight. The *Campana* will not return here from Pictou this trip as has been her usual custom, owing to the broken propeller, but will proceed direct to Quebec.

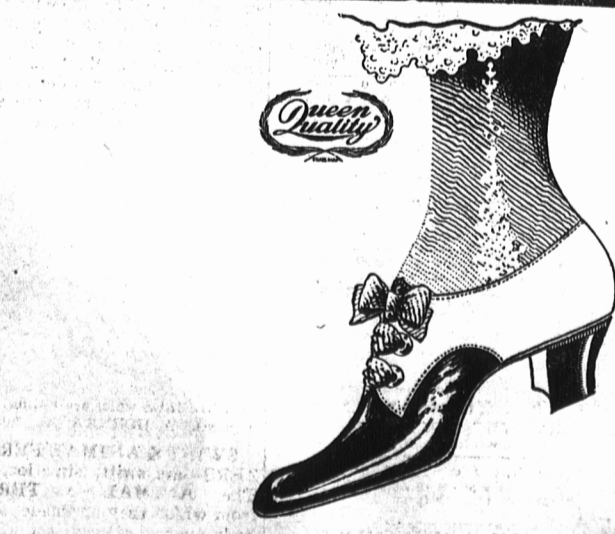
