Canadian Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, June 11 — (CP) — The Canadian Navy has developed a new life-saving jacket, designed to protect men from underwater blast and featuring a signal light, it was announced here today by Capt. Archie McCallum, director of medical services for the Royal Canadian Navy.

The jacket, starting to be distributed among Canadian ships was developed by the Medical Research Unit of the navy at Toronto and most of the experiments were conducted by Lieut. Campbell Cowan. It is regarded as the finest in the world.

The jacket, made of water-resistant fabric and filled with kapoc gives protection to the lower abdomen, necessary because of underwater blasts. Attached to the collar is a yellow cap with a light on top which will flash on and off as a distress signal. The light is powered by a small battery carried in a pocket.

and will burn for 48 hours or longer. It can be seen for a long distance, either from the air or water. Also attached to the jacket is a six-foot length of rope with a snap on the end. It can be used to lash a man to a raft or lifeboat, whether he is in the water or not. It also has two canvas handles by which a man can be lifted to a raft or up the side of a ship. The jacket is much warmer than the type now in use. An order for 75,000 has been made. Capt. McCallum said and the estimated cost \$15 each.
