The Minneapolis Journal of April 21st contains the following of interest in this Province. Archibald McGregor, one of Montana's most prominent pioneers, died today at the summer home of his daughter Mrs. J. D. Anderson, at Medicine Lake. He was born in 1835 in Charlottetown, P. E. I. He enlisted in the Twenty-first regiment of New York, and after serving two years was mustered out on account of injuries received in the battle of Antietam. He went to Montana, where for many years he was one of its most influential citizens. He was the owner of the famous Confederate Gulch mine, and for the last few years he has been interested in mining in Alaska, for which he had intended to leave in a few days. He was a Mason. He married Julia Isabel, daughter of Captain Spencer Clifford, of North Edgecombe, Me., on April 7th, 1870. Mr. Gregor leaves three sisters and two brothers in Prince Edward Island.

On Friday April 3rd, the grim messenger, Death, visited the home of William Robinson, South Rustico, and conveyed to the peaceful shore his beloved wife, Jane Ellen. As will be remembered by her friends Mrs. Robinson had undergone an operation last spring in the Prince Edward Island Hospital and from this she never fully recovered. Recently complications set in which proved fatal. Deceased was a woman such as it is a rare thing to meet with, possessed of those high womanly qualities which go to make one respected and admired by all. As a wife, a mother, a daughter, in short in all her relations in life she had reached that standard to which few attain. She was beloved and mourned by all who knew her. She died fully trusting in Him whose blood cleanseth from all sin. Fitting to the occasion seemed the text of her funeral service, "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord from henceforth; Yea, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them" (Rev. 14, 13). Besides a sorrowing husband and large family of children, she leaves a very large circle of relatives and friends to mourn their sad loss.—Com.

Ever anxious for the welfare of others her patient spirit acted as a benediction and will long be remembered. She leaves to mourn two sons David and Havelock and two daughters Mrs. A. Hardy of Mill River, and Miss Margaret at home to whom is tendered sincere sympathy.—Com.
