Geary, V. C. Hero, Becomes Parson

LONDON, Dec 4—The Hill 60 hero, Benjamin Handley Geary, V. C., M. A. of Keeble College Oxford, and Wycliffe Hall, West Ham, was ordained to the Church of England priesthood at the Church of England Cathedral in the presence of a large congregation, including his wife and mother. The service was conducted by the Bishop of Chelmsford, with the Bishop of Colchester in attendance. In all, eleven candidates were ordained, five priests and six deacons.

My Wild Irish Rose

One of the biggest productions of the year was the attraction at the Prince Edward Theatre on Monday. It is entitled "My Wild Irish Rose" and is a screen adaptation of "The Shaughraun," Dion Boucicault's great Irish melodrama of nearly fifty years ago, and which is particularly timely in view of the present political situation in Ireland. The remainder of the cast, which includes little Richard Daniels, who made such a hit in "The Little Minister," has been selected with equal care. "My Wild Irish Rose" will be repeated today for the last time. An excellent program in keeping with the picture story was played by Miss Hilda Barnes.

Four Teams Enter Independent Hockey League For 1923

AMHERST Dec 4—Independent representations from Moncton, New Glasgow, Stellarton and Amherst met here this evening and decided on an independent hockey league for the winter. It was decided that the series should be played in two rounds of twelve games each and that the winners of the two rounds should play off at home and home game. The first round is necessary to be played on neutral ice. The rule of the C. A. A. U. are to govern with such eliminations as seen necessary in the judgment of the executive. Games are to start at 8.15 sharp and no importation of players is to be permitted after February 1st, without the consent of the executive.

Siki Carpentier Battle To Be Taken To Court

PARIS, Dec 4—The affaire Siki, surrounding the big Senegalese prize fighter, who won the light heavyweight championship of the world by defeating Georges Carpentier, but whose title was recently taken away from him by the boxing federation and who also was denied the right to engage in pugilistic contests for nine months, is to be threshed out before the courts. A complete investigation of the circumstances surrounding the Carpentier-Siki fight which the Senegalese deputy, Di-Deputies last week in open debate as a "frame-up" is to be made by the civil tribunal.

Criqui Defeats Billy Matthews In Hard Battle

PARIS, Dec 4—Eugene Criqui, the French batamweight champion last night settled all arguments as to the featherweight title of Europe by decisively defeating Billy Matthews, of England, in the seventeenth round, when the referee stopped the fight to save Matthews from further punishment.
