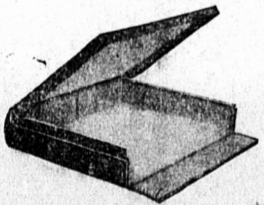

—THE MORWENNA.—The Morwenna of the Black Diamond Line is due in Summerside early this morning from Montreal and will be in port for the greater part of the day, having a large inward and outward freight.—J.

—FARM PURCHASED.—Mr. Archibald Oakes, Chief of Police, Summerside, has sold to Mr. Frank Hall his valuable farm property, comprising 52 acres, most of which is situated within the town limits. Mr. Hall has also purchased the standing crop from Mr. Oakes.—J.

—CARGO PURCHASED.—The cargo of lumber of the wrecked schooner Irene has been purchased by Messrs. Arsenault and Gaudet, Wellington, and is being unloaded and floated ashore at Fifteen Point. The schooner will likely be a total loss.—J.

—SCHOOLS RE-OPEN.—At the special request of the Summerside School Board, through the Department of Education, permission has been granted the Summerside School Board to re-open the Summerside schools on Tuesday, September 2nd (same as has been granted Charlottetown), instead of August 26th.

—PROPERTY PURCHASE.—Mr. E. H. Raynor, Cascumpeque, has purchased from the estate of the late Stewart Green, 22 acres of land on the Pope Road which contains the handsome grove in which Mr. Raynor is erecting a large fox ranch. It is Mr. Raynor's intention to take up his residence in Summerside in the near future.—J.

—POLICE COURT.—At the Charlottetown Police Court Friday afternoon the Prohibition case of Allan Boieser vs. Robert Stanley resulted in a conviction and the usual fine of \$100 and costs was imposed. Saturday morning two drunks, James Beers and Samuel Brown were each fined \$5 or twenty days and Wm. Mahar for being drunk and incapable was adjourned till Tuesday morning.

FUNERAL OF MR. J. GOULD.—The funeral of the late Mr. John Gould took place yesterday afternoon from the residence of Mr. Claud Kennedy, with whom deceased had resided for the past four or five years, to the Peoples Cemetery, and was very largely attended. The services at the house and at the grave site were conducted by Rev. H. J. Fraser. The pall bearers were Messrs. John D. Goss, Thomas Frizel, John Todd, W. B. McNeill and J. M. Noonan.—J.

—THE LATE H. LEARD.—The funeral of the late Mr. Holland Leard took place yesterday afternoon from his late residence to the Methodist Church where a short funeral service was held, being conducted by Revs. H. J. Fraser and J. B. Rice. The choir rendered a special program of music, including a solo. Face to Face, by Mr. F. W. McSwain. While the corpse was being removed from church the Dead March in Saul was played on the organ. The interment took place in the Peoples Cemetery. The pall bearers were Messrs. William Callbeck, Horace Wright, Artemas McCaull and Elias Schurman, all of Bedeque.—J.

—POLICE COURT.—In the Police Court at Summerside on Saturday before his honor Judge McLeod, acting Stipendiary Magistrate, the Prohibition case of Inspector Phillips vs. Mrs. S. Phillips came up for hearing. In this case there was only one witness against the defendant who testified to getting beer which he claimed intoxicated him. The defendant acknowledged selling the beer but claimed it was under three per cent and that the witness was intoxicated when he bought the beer. The latter part of the defendant's evidence was corroborated by another witness. Upon request of Mr. McCallum, for the defendant the case was adjourned until Thursday next for further evidence. One drunk, a man named Burke at Miscouche, was fined \$15 or one month in jail.—J.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

LONDON, Aug. 20 (Special)—Walter Hines Page, United States Ambassador to the Court of St. James, called at the British Foreign Office this afternoon and saw the Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, to whom he tendered the regret of the American Government for the recent attack made on the British Foreign Office by Henry Lane Wilson, United States Ambassador to Mexico. The incident is now regarded as closed.

HONG KONG, Aug. 20 (Special)—A typhoon which raged here yesterday attained a velocity of 105 miles an hour, and when it was at its height caused the gunboat Wilmington, attached to the third division of the United States Asiatic fleet, to fire distress signals. A tug towed the warship to shelter. When the typhoon had moderated the British destroyer Otter steamed out of the harbor in search of the pleasure yacht Truy, which had on board the officers of the British receiving ship Tamar. The officers were safely landed by the destroyer.
