WAR VETERAN AS PREFERRED CITIZEN

"The Returned Soldier in Canada Should Be Regarded As a Preferred Citizen" Declares Ont. Conservative Member.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Describing a number of cases of returned soldiers who he claimed had received shabby treatment from the Pensions Board, T. L. Church, (Cons., Toronto, N.W.), continued the debate on soldiers' pensions. He urged the House to take immediate action and said it might well spend a week on the question now rather than refer it to a committee which would mean indefinite delay.

Prem. Objects To Question Asked By Conservative

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—In the House of Commons today, Prime Minister MacKenzie King objected to a question on the order paper submitted by Colonel S. C. Robinson, Conservative, Essex West. It read: "What steps, if any, has the Government taken to put a stop to the shooting and murdering by American enforcement officers of Canadian citizens?" Mr. King suggested that the question was a reflection on a friendly nation. Speaker Lamoureux declared that the question was out of order.

January Earnings Of Can. Pacific

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 28.—The January earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railways showed a decrease as compared with January of 1929, according to the figures released today. The net earnings for the first month of the current year showed a decline of \$1,160,150, dropping from \$1,895,923 to \$735,773. The gross earnings for January were \$13,671,403 as compared with \$15,865,899 in January, 1929. The working expenses were \$11,935,620 as against \$13,969,677 last year.

Latest Doings At The Conference

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Feb. 28.—The Naval Conference breathed easier tonight after President McDonald's Labor Government had won the vote on the coal bill, 280 to 271. With MacDonald's Government safely over the issue, the Conference will continue its careful course tomorrow, its decisions still needing the approval of the French delegation when it returns.

DOINGS IN THE FEDERAL PARLIAMENT

Public Works Dept. Criticized With Regard To Fair Wage Clause—Men Working For 25 cents Per Hour, 10 hr. Day.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Estimates for the Department of Public Works were considered by the House of Commons in the committee of supply today. In connection with a vote of \$9,500 for a breakwater wharf extension at Broad Cove Marsh, Inverness County, Cape Breton, I. D. MacDougall, Conservative, Inverness asked if the work was being done there by contract or by day labor. Mr. Elliott replied that it was being done by contract. Newspaperman Passes Away

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 28.—James Ross Munro, 45, well known newspaperman, died at his home here today. Mr. Munro started his newspaper career with his father, the late Robert Munro, publisher of the Port Elgin, Ont., Times. He later served for various periods on the editorial staffs of the Niagara Falls Record, the Brantford Expositor, and the Toronto Globe. He was Managing Editor of the Ottawa Free Press when that paper was merged with the present Ottawa Journal. He returned to Toronto and after further service with the Toronto Globe and later with the Toronto Star, entered the advertising agency business for some time he had been connected with the firm of Lord Thomas and Logan.

REACHED AGREEMENT

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 28.—Charles K. Curtis, United States Minister to Santo Domingo, formally advised the State Department late today that the government of the Dominican Republic and the opposition had reached an agreement at one p. m.

Predicts Paved Highways Soon For Nova Scotia

(Canadian Press) NEW GLASGOW, Feb. 28.—"We now have a motor vehicle registration in Nova Scotia of nearly 40,000 cars," said Hon. P. C. Black, Minister of Highways in the Nova Scotia Government, addressing a banquet held under the auspices of the New Glasgow Board of Trade here tonight. "The average increase during the past five years has been 14 per cent. If during the next twenty years the increase is even less than one-half of this percentage, or 6 per cent, we shall have 120,000 registered cars in Nova Scotia within that time."

Visions Welland Hive Of Industry

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Feb. 28.—Eventual creation of Canada's greatest industrial area in the Welland Canal zone following completion of the ship canal, is the aim of a private bill which Mark Vaughn, M. L. A., for Thorold, last night told the local chamber of commerce he would introduce in the Ontario Legislature this week.

Largest Brooder House In World

(Special to the Guardian) VANCOUVER, Feb. 28.—What is said to be the largest brooder house in the world is being operated on the Fraserview Manor Farm in Surrey district near here. The brooder house which is 900 feet in length and divided into forty-four compartments, has accommodation for 60,000 chickens.

CANADIAN MINESWEEPER GROUNDED

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 28.—One of the four mine sweepers of the Royal Canadian navy, H. M. C. S. Thispreval, has grounded on an uncharted rock in Barclay Sound, on the west coast of Vancouver Island, B. C., according to telegraphic advices to naval headquarters. Department of National Defence. The grounding occurred at comparatively low tide, and, as the tide was ebbing the crew of 22, including two officers, took to lifeboats in case the vessel should turn over. Hopes were entertained that the vessel could be refloated at high tide.

Conferences May Provide Issue For General Election

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—The Prime Minister with Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, and Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Finance, are the members of the Canadian Government delegation which it is proposed to send over to the two conferences in London in September—the Economic Conference and the regular Imperial Conference. At least, this is the designated representation if the present Government, in the last analysis, has the sending. The choice, as a matter of fact, will depend upon whether or not there is a general election this year and, if so, what is its result.
