SCHOOL TO MAKE BRIDES EXPERT HOUSEKEEPERS. PITTSBURG, Jan. 12.—A school for brides was announced today as an addition to the curriculum of the Margaret Morrison Carnegie School for Women. Newly married women will be instructed without interfering with

their household duties, because the classes will require only a few hours in the afternoons. The new class will open this month. The complete course includes cooking, from boiling eggs to the highest plane of making pastries in ten lessons; dressmaking, ten lessons; shirt-waist making, ten lessons; millinery, fifteen lessons; and garment design, twenty lessons. Dean West has received more than fifty applications from young married women of Pittsburg and nearby towns before deciding to open classes. It is announced the instruction in no way will encourage elopements of young girls. It is stipulated that every student must be at least twenty-one.

PORTUGUESE MUST PAY RENT OR QUIT.

LISBON, Portugal, (Via Frontier)—Jan. 12.—The peasants in the district of Azambuja on the river Tagus are greatly agitated over the decision of the government that the vast area of land and woods in the vicinity belongs to the state and that the inhabitants must either pay rent, or abandon the territory.

A body of peasants yesterday armed themselves with rifles, knives and revolvers and attacked the soldiers stationed in the neighborhood. In the course of the fight four of the peasants were killed and twenty wounded. Reinforcements of cavalry were sent to the scene of the disturbance from Lisbon and dispersed the demonstrators.

DOUBLE CRIME OF INSANE YOUTH.

MILFORD, Mass., Jan. 12.—While temporarily insane, Clarence L. Racine 17, killed his mother, Mrs. Louis Racine, 46, with a butcher knife, set fire to the house, slashed his throat and then put a bullet in his own brain. The fire was extinguished with little loss.

From the appearance of the room it is believed that Mrs. Racine fought valiantly to save her life from the hands of her son, trail of blood and upset furniture from the kitchen through the dining room and into a bedroom showed that Mrs. Racine had tried her best to overpower her boy. The body of the woman was found in a bedroom with the head almost severed from the body.

After killing his mother young Racine set fire to the bed in the chamber. Then he went into the dining room and killed himself. The firemen responded to an alarm found the body of the boy. In the chamber the woman's body was discovered.

The father of the boy thinks that his dead son must have been temporarily insane. Clarence had been in poor health for a long time, suffering from epileptic fits. It is believed that while he was suffering from one of these attacks he killed his mother. It was thought at first that possibly Mrs. Racine might have attacked her son while despondent.

Medical Examiner W. J. Clark said that Clarence killed his mother and then committed suicide by slashing his throat with a knife and shooting himself with a revolver. Dr. Clark said that the knife wound was not sufficient to cause death. The bullet wound was one in the head. The revolver was found beside the boy's body.

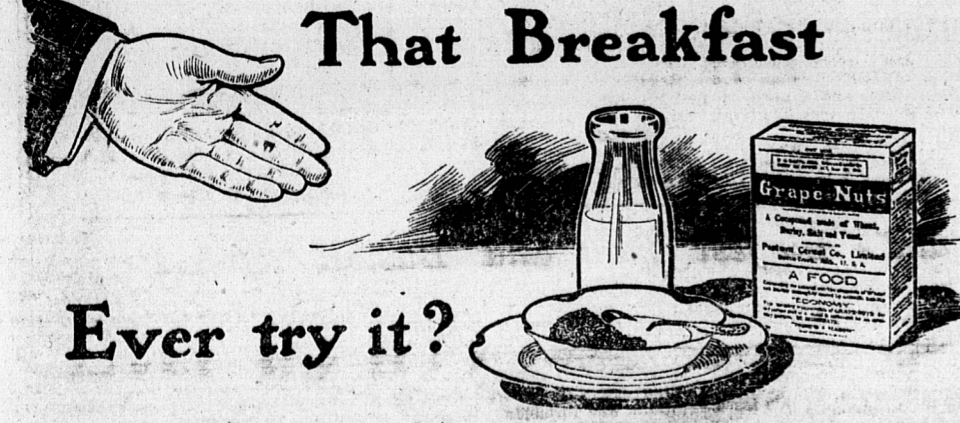
